Bishop's Address to the 85th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester

I would like to begin this address with a few words of thanks and welcome. What a treat to be with all of you here at Hobart and William Smith Colleges; thank you, President Gearen, students and staff for your warm welcome! We are so blessed to have Presiding Bishop Curry with us for a good long visit with his alma mater, the Diocese and the greater Rochester community. We thank God for his restored health and thank him for his leadership during this time of great challenge within and outside the Church. We also thank his Canon Michael Hunn and his Assistant Sharon Jones for accompanying and taking good care of him.

I thank God for the privilege of serving as your Bishop. Since last Convention I have had the joy of confirming, receiving and reaffirming nearly 80 individuals who have stood before God and their families of faith, and promised to renounce evil and follow Jesus. They said YES to the journey of following Jesus faithfully by being the hands and feet and heart of God in this troubled world. In all that we do there is nothing more important than to help form and accompany individuals as they follow Jesus. This is the purpose for which we strive to thrive and grow congregations in spiritual, missional and numerical ways. I want to thank our amazing staff members who work very hard with great versatility, dedication and humor. Without such a reliable staff we could not accomplish half of what we do by the grace of God. I invite them to stand as they are able and please hold your applause until I finish calling them by name: Carolyn McConnell, Todd Rubiano, Johnnie Ross, Kristy Estey, Matt Townsend, Cathy Shoemaker, Kristin Woodward, Winifred Collin, the Deans: David Hefling (on sabbatical), Debs Duguid-May, Dahn Gandell, Carol Stewart and Phil Kasey. Thank you for your joyful and loyal amazingness! Please show them some love!

On a personal level, I am grateful for Eklan, Ned and Roja who are significant to my ministry among you. I continue to give thanks for Roja who is a great blessing to me and to our world. We celebrated our twenty-fifth anniversary in October this year; thanks be to God! Her companionship has made this journey possible, especially during times when it has been challenging. She is offering a TedX Talk right now on an intervention model of delivering education to children who are dehumanized by their circumstances.

This had been a significant year for some big decisions and I will highlight them throughout my address. I will acknowledge a major decision by the Trustees and Standing Committee to sell Diocesan House, not out of necessity, but as an expression of good fiscal and spiritual stewardship. I also express my appreciation to members of Standing Committee for working diligently to help move us toward rebuilding relationships with the help of a behavioral covenant, which I commend to the rest of the diocese.

Commission on Ministry has had a busy year with ongoing local and diocesan discernments. They have helped us Ordain four amazing Priests. With their advice we were able to begin a Pastoral Leader model to help enable transitions in more relevant and congregation-friendly ways. We have adopted a Circle of Support mentoring model to accompany clergy in new cures. Typically Circles of Support involve one clergy on speed dial, one or two other clergy and two or three lay persons. They covenant to meet monthly for a year and are a sounding board to the new clergy. We greatly appreciate this collegial model.

Speaking of new clergy, we have a few! I ask you to please stand as you hear your name and let us wait until all of them stand before acclaiming and applauding them. Rev. Troy Preston, Christ Church Corning; Rev. Christa Levesque, St. Thomas' Rochester, Rev. Andrew VanBuren, St. John's Clifton Springs; Rev. Virginia Tyler, St. John's Honeoye Falls; Rev. Jimmie Sue Deppe, Epiphany Gates; Leslie Burkardt, St. Thomas' Rochester; Rev. Cameron Miller, Trinity Geneva; Rev. Eric Thompson, St. Peter's Dansville and Trinity, Canasarega; In August we welcomed Rev. Canon Johnnie Ross as Canon to the Ordinary. Along with Jimmie Sue, Leslie, Cameron, and Johnnie, we were grateful to have Dean Debs Duguid-May transfer canonical residence from Michigan, ...Texas, Buffalo, Lexington, and Natal, South Africa respectively. Our newest priest is Rev. Keith Patterson; Two Saints Rochester. He comes to us from New Hampshire. We welcome each of them and their loved ones to our Diocese!

We also have a few transitions by way of retirements and discerned moves. Rev. Michael Hartney retired in ... after ... years of service as Rector from the Episcopal Parishes of Schuyler County. Rev. Charlie Tyo Jr., retired in ... after ... years of service as Rector from Christ Church in Corning. Earlier this year we were sorry to say goodbye to Rev. Canon Julie Cicora who discerned to move out of the role she had as Canon for mission and ministry after seven years to pursue new frontiers. We are sorry to see Revs. Andrew and Sara D'angio White leave. Andrew is preparing to take a new cure at St. David's in Kennebunk, Maine in December this year. We also have a few transitions among the Deans. After this Convention, Dean Phil Kasey will pass the baton to Rev. Lynne Sharp, Dean Debs Duguid-May to Rev. Lance Robbins and Dean Carol Stewart to Rev. Eric Thompson. We thank you all for your ministry in service of Christ among us. We will miss each of you very much and you will always have a place in our hearts. Roja and I will especially miss Maggie and Charlie. We wish you all of God's blessings. We love you! Diocesan Council has consistently done a stellar job of working diligently to engage congregational and missional development partnerships along with ensuring a thoughtfully constructed budget with enough time since June of this year to explain and engage its details over several District level meetings.

The year-long pilgrimage of *Seeing the Face of God in Each Other* has included several engagements at the local and Diocesan levels. Across the Diocese faithful people have gathered around this theme engaging books, movies and conversation with a desire to understand complexities, build reconciliation and expand community. Listening to truth, history and analysis is hard and there is always nervous energy to overcome, but we have stayed at it, engaged each other and are beginning to understand that as followers of Christ we have the capacity to engage, repent, and embrace. We have had four Diocesan-wide events on New Americans, Generous Welcome, Migrant Workers, and Native Americans. This Sunday at 3 PM we will have a public forum with our Presiding Bishop and a panel on *Nightmare to Dream: overcoming the unholy trinity of poverty, racism, and violence*.

A bishop is called to see. I have been observing our Diocese and our life together over the past eight years and have come to see several examples of discipleship that embrace Jesus. In each of these instances I see that we have enough resources available to do everything we need to do in response to Jesus' call to feed his sheep in spiritual and missional ways. I see two commonalities n these examples. 1. They are examples of faithful people discerning and moving purposefully outside themselves and into their neighborhoods. 2. The proof of every movement into the neighborhood is in the doing. So that's a sample of what I see.

- The Storybook Project keeps families connected even when a parent in prison.
- Community Gardens keep communities growing produce and hope.
- Migrant families remind us that we are all immigrants. They also know that they have friends who care for them as dignified children of God and are looking out for them.
- Neighbors Night Out is a mentoring place where children are treated with their God given dignity and showered with loads of love.
- The Church-wide All Our Children or its local diocesan manifestation Rachel Rejoices is a coalition to enhance our children's education.
- Our interfaith and ecumenical partners stand united for peace and against hate of every kind.
- Missional connection with Episcopal Relief and Development, and other international partners keeps us faithfully Anglican by engaging vulnerable communities in a postcolonial world.

These initiatives/interventions come out of a commitment from small groups of leaders who discern and take on these areas as their own proving again the truth in Margaret Mead's words, "never doubt that a small group of thoughtful committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

The Episcopal Diocese of Rochester was officially inaugurated at its first Convention in December of 1931. Forty churches sent their delegates to this primary convention held at Trinity Church in Geneva. It was out of the crucible of the Great Depression that the Episcopal Diocese was re-constituted out of the Diocese of Western New York. Here we are at the 85th Convention with a desire to see the face of God in each other. As a Diocese, we are currently forty five congregations; five congregations more than we were in 1931. God willing and the people consenting we will bless a new church plant this afternoon. We will do this in collaboration with our full

communion partners in Christ's mission and ministry, the Evangelical Lutheran Church. I pray that this is the first of many new and innovative church plants to come in the years ahead of us.

I also see some things that are not of God even though they are made to appear as though they are from God. Another word for bishop is Ordinary. One who sees and appoints arranges or orders, in other words, ordains. Part of arranging is rearranging, relearning and repenting. As one who sees, one is also responsible to call upon our Church and this nation to a deep repentance for the tolerating and acquiescing to the original sin of racism. Within this sin is contained one of the most significant lies. It is this: some humans are superior to others. This is the same chip off the old block of millennia-old casteism, which civilizations like India systematized. Casteism and racism have a similar premise that some are innately more pure, more superior, and more exceptional than others. This lie was furthered by a flaw in theology that blessed one of the foundational assumptions in the Doctrine of Discovery that heathens could be dominated in the name of God and the emperor. This assumption logically leads to manifest destiny, which is the original sin of America, Racism. It is this pitting people one against the other that is still bearing fruits of bitterness in our country. The sin of racism is so virulent that it is not just a white and black thing. It is a doctrine that sustains itself because every human being is capable of accommodating to the notion that some other human being is less than him or her. I have met some of the most discriminatory people who are Dalits, formerly referred to as "untouchables," discriminating against other Dalits. The same is becoming true in the US. Look at what we have done with the way we have polarized police and those killed by police violence. Every single life is important to God and to us.

Two years ago (September 3, 2014), Rochester police officer, Daryl Pierson was shot and killed during a traffic stop. I remember changing the blue light bulb outside our home last Christmas after nearly two years because we all mourned his loss. According to National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund, between January 1 and November 1, 100 officers were killed in 2015 and 111 officers in 2016. This is a tragedy that cannot be normalized in a democracy. It is even more tragic that, according to the Guardian and Washington Post, over 1000 men, women and children of all races were shot and killed by police in 2015. This year the count is around 850. Houston, Rochester, Iowa, America, we have a problem! It goes back to the original sin of America, Racism. As long as one person can justify that someone else is less than them that someone else can be disposed literally or figuratively. Martin Luther King Jr., is his last book, "Where do we go from here?" named this reality as the triple evil nexus of racism, poverty and militarism/war/violence. All three contexts share one thing in common. They all deal with someone who has become some "thing."

Continuing to see, I look at the diocese after eight years of serving and reflecting from this perch. I can unequivocally say that the single most significant practice that enhances our ability to grow spiritually, numerically and in missional leadership is the practice of discernment. I see faithful people entering conversations of significance at several levels. These conversations are not about preserving a church that does not exist anymore in a culture that started shifting a few decades ago. These conversations, in many instances, are taking place in the midst of real struggles to pay the bills, to take care of old buildings, to contend with a culture that does not provide the tailwind for this ecclesial bird anymore. The church of the twenty first century finds itself straining against all odds to defy gravity, to fly and sing the Lord's song in a strange cultural landscape. In the words of Wendell Berry, "The mind that is not baffled in not employed. It is the impeded stream that sings." Well, impeded we are! Discernment is born out of the labor pains of our current predicament. It is becoming a normal organic and dynamic process.

In many contexts, I see faithful people not only discern but also follow through with decisions of great relevance and sometimes of strategic significance. What this means is that groups of leaders are willing to experiment on new initiatives with the clarity that not everything will succeed in the way we expect them to the very first time. Sometimes they do, and often they don't and help us see things differently having traveled down the path of a particular experiment.

Recently, I was heartened to see the spirit of some of what we are trying to do organically being framed within a conversation template from the evangelism initiatives of Episcopal Church on a one-on-one level. There is much to

be curious about including overcoming some of our fear and learning new approaches and even a new vocabulary/language, which leads us to opening new worldviews. One set of the questions in this template stood out as significant since it had to do with worldview: When have you seen your church fail at something together? What did you learn? I am sure we can practice and learn from these significant and beautiful questions on one-on-one relational questions. (http://www.episcopalchurch.org/posts/evangelisminitiatives/one-one-relational-meetings)

In this 85th Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Church in 2016, we are acknowledging and supporting a new church plant as an unorganized mission in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church. The South Wedge Mission is the first Church plant mission we have successfully witnessed in over half a century in our Diocese. The significance of building planting a church with an ecumenical partner around the 499th anniversary of Martin Luther hammering the 95 thesis to the door a church on October 31, 1517 in Wittenberg Germany is quite profound! God is good!

In Grace Church, Lyons, we are witnessing movement and a discerned transition from a traditional congregation to a new mission with a youth group of over a dozen young people from migrant families who become the new leaven to raise the dough in this new mission. In Montour Falls, we are making our governance simpler by closing a mission structure while the faithful will continue to do mission. Good Shepherd in Savona has discerned that it is time to take their place as a parish in this diocese. Finally, we are starting a College for Congregational Development to substantially undergird the formation of leadership in our region. In each of these contexts a small group of leaders have taken their agency seriously in that having seen the need for thoughtful action they have not kicked the can down the road. In each of these situations we have paid attention to relationality and sustainability accompanied by a determination to follow Jesus beyond our comfort zone.

These and several other plans and actions are filled with hope and promise as we look ahead. We must also remember that we have discerned to redirect resources. These decisions have been made after honest conversations that have involved several groups of faithful people.

We have revised our diocesan staff size and reduced silos within by operating in a networking paradigm that builds on a culture of relationship and trust.

We have a Health Reimbursement Account plan for retired clergy and lay employees expanding the tent of equity.

We have redirected resources to the Christian formation of leaders by starting a College for Congregational Development that we hope will bless our Diocese and this entire region.

We have increased congregational and missional Development Partnership Grants while transforming the partnership grant mechanism with annual monitoring and evaluation processes.

We have invested in congregations and empowered search committees to discern and call full or close to full-time priests by attracting and bringing new clergy leadership to the Diocese.

We have set in place term-defined appointment of Deans to enhance and spread leadership development.

In our governance, we have encouraged a spirit of working committees that work collaboratively with staff in the discernment of decisions.

We have transferred most of our communications to electronic media.

We have made a disciplined effort to successfully reduce our percentage of draw from investments, put a cap on loans, streamlined congregational investments though direct administration, and more.

We have engaged with the help of an external consultant in a nearly two-year process to listen deeply and sit with individuals in their places of hurt to move towards reconciliation and transformation of relationships.

We have proactively discerned and decided to move out of Diocesan House in alignment with our mission as an act of stewardship and hope.

We have corrected our response to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society's assessment and will catch up in the next two years.

We have witnessed a resurgence of energy and creativity in our ministry among youth with about five intentional opportunities and a proposed annual Confirmation retreat.

In each of these instances a small group of local or diocesan governance group with the help of Diocesan staff stopped long enough to figure out a path forward and then acted on it. The diocese is in a healthier place because of such thoughtful discernment. In answer to our prayers from the past, we have been feeding on the Spirit and taking it to the streets because we are the ones we've been waiting for.

What do I see in the future? I see young people securing green jobs and staying back and moving back in our rural, suburban and urban areas. I see us overcoming poverty and violence in our city, and with the symbolic filling of the inner loop I see more intentional investments and exchange of mutual resources from our city and suburbs increasing. I see our Church playing a more active role in facilitating these estranged connections. I see more and more culturally diverse liturgies, Christian formation opportunities and direct services of respite for single and working parents in our suburbs and cities fostering greater unity and a sense of belonging in our communities.

I see the police and people of all hues being more connected with communities of color and less alienated from each other. I see a debunking of the myth of white superiority by power structures and people in power to overcome the indifference and hatred that infect our common psyche with deeper engagements building on recent responses to White Rochester propaganda. I see our ecumenical and interfaith bonds being strengthened progressively with a strategic commitment to overcome poverty and violence in our communities.

We have a savior who redeems us and the Holy Spirit who companions us. We have trustworthy servant leaders to guide us. We have friends of all faiths and persuasions who journey with us. We have bread and wine to sustain us. Gifts of music and sacred spaces to spur us.... God's word to inspire us..... Good friends to comfort us..... Good humor to delight us.... We have a wounded world to heal before and around us. We are sinners and saints.... the body of Christ.... We are God's beloved agents of change and transformation. Together we are the face of God in our world today....

We are forging ahead, not with the arrogance of Christendom, but with the confidence in a Christ-like grace; not with the clarity that we know everything we need to know but with the clarity that we can depend on God by our side and trust that all will be well; not with the attitude of being saviors who can fix other people or systems, but with the loving curiosity about neighbor and neighborhoods to make things better than they are; not with the bitterness of fighting on the platform of us versus them, but with the compassion that others are struggling just like we are. Whether it was Plato, Philo or Ian Maclaren, the wisdom is eternal: *Be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle.*

Let us make special efforts to gather around nonpartisan tables at home, at work, at park and at church. Beyond the elections we have each other, not the campaigns that have consumed us. It is time to regroup so we can build on being a country with a great heart and the salt-of-the-earth people that we really are. My friends, we have a good country that works best when we all pull together. So let us vote, walk and pray our way out of this divisive election season and become the beloved community that Jesus calls us to be.

JOURNAL OF THE 85th DIOCESAN CONVENTION

The 85th Convention of the Diocese of Rochester was held November 5, 2016 at Hobart & William Smith Colleges in Geneva, NY.

OPENING OF CONVENTION/ESTABLISHMENT OF A QUORUM

The Rt. Rev. Prince G. Singh opened the Convention at 8:15 a.m. with a Gathering Liturgy and prayer.

Welcome

The Bishop extended a warm welcome to guests, convention delegates, and clergy to the 85th convention. The Bishop introduced Mr. Mark Gearan, President of Hobart and William Smith Colleges and welcomed special guest, the Most Reverend Michael B. Curry, Presiding Bishop. He presented each of them with a traditional Indian gift of a shawl.

President Gearan then welcomed delegates and guests to the colleges and expressed gratitude to Bishop Singh for his service to the Colleges and to the Episcopal churches in Geneva which provide a variety of services to the Colleges. He then welcomed back "a son of Hobart" – Presiding Bishop Curry and noted that the Colleges honored the Presiding Bishop with the Alumni Association's Medal of Honor the previous evening.

The Bishop thanked those from the college and all the volunteers for their hospitality and recognized additional honored guests: Canon Michael Hunn, Presiding Bishop's office; Ms. Sharon Jones, Executive Coordinator to the Presiding Bishop and Primate; Bishop John Macholz, ELCA; Amy Williams Fowler, Presbytery Leader of Genesee Valley, Father Bill Laird, Dean of the East Deanery, Roman Catholic Diocese of Rochester; the Rev. Albert Sam, Diocese of WNY; the Rev. Donald Smith, retired clergy EDOR; Roja, Julie Ross and others. The Bishop also announced the recognition of Savona as a Parish.

Quorum

The Bishop called upon the Secretary who established a quorum was present.

FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

The Bishop called the meeting to order and noted that all ordained Episcopal clergy functioning in charge of congregations by canonical residence or license with this Diocese shall have seat, voice and vote. According to ARTICLE III (c), the Chancellor, Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese and Lay Canons also have seat, voice and vote except in the case of a vote by Orders.

Majority Vote

The Secretary established the numbers needed for a majority vote.

Introduction of the Secretary and Election of a New Secretary

The Bishop introduced the Secretary, Ms. Susan Woodhouse and presented her with the gift of a cross in thanks for her service. He indicated that she would serve through this meeting. He then explained the process of calling a new secretary in accordance with the Canons and announced that he and the Standing Committee have nominated the Rev. Andrea Stridiron to be Secretary of the Diocese. He asked for a motion from the floor to confirm the nomination. **MSP**

Introduction of the Chancellor and the Assistant Chancellors

The Bishop introduced the Chancellor, Philip Fileri, Esq. who will also serve as the Parliamentarian, and the Assistant Chancellors, Thomas Wright, Esq. and Paul Green, Esq.

Introduction of Treasurer

The Bishop introduced the Treasurer, Mr. Terry Butwid and the Assistant Treasurer, Ms. Bliss Owen.

Appointment of a Chaplain

The Bishop appointed the Rev. Maurice Charles as Chaplain of this convention noting that he will be available for private conversation any time during the Convention. He also invited the Convention to keep Rev. Charles in their prayers due to the recent loss of his father.

Reading of the Minutes of the 84th Diocesan Convention

The Bishop announced that the Committee on the Reading of the Minutes had reviewed the minutes of the 84th Diocesan Convention as posted on the website and made available in print at all Pre-Convention District Meetings. He called for a motion to waive the reading of those minutes and to accept the minutes of the 84th Diocesan Convention. **MSP**

Appointment of Registrar and Assistant Registrar

The Bishop appointed Ms. Kristy Estey to serve as Registrar and Ms. Carolyn McConnell as Assistant Registrar. He reminded the Convention that during the course of the meeting, alternates who wish to be seated in place of a delegate should report to the registration desk, provide the paperwork for the substitution, signed by the parish Rector or Priest in Charge and the Secretary of Convention and also that amendments to resolutions should be presented in writing to the Secretary.

Committee on Elections

The Bishop appointed the Committee on Elections: The Rev. Andrew Van Buren, Chair; Patti Blaine, John Bouwens, Barbara Drake, Nathan Kohlmeier, Michael Laver, staff and declared the polls open.

Committee on Credentials

The Bishop appointed the Committee on Credentials: (1 clergy, 2 lay) The Rev. Jay Burkardt, Chair; Kristy Estey, Registrar; Susan Woodhouse, Secretary to Convention.

Seat and Voice as Reported by the Committee on Credentials

The Bishop called upon the Chair of the Committee on Credentials, the Rev. Jay Burkardt to make the report of the Committee on Credentials:

The Chair of the Committee on Credentials, the Rev. Jay Burkhart, reported the credentials of the delegates were in order. He cited Article III, Section 2(c) of the Constitution and moved that the courtesy of seat and voice be granted to the guests of convention. Included were:

- All members of elected or appointed bodies and committees of this Diocese
- All committees and organizations funded through programs of this Diocese
- Officers of the Diocese
- All Diocesan staff
- Young people of the Diocese present at this Convention
- All spouses, partners and guests present at this Convention, including SPICE
- All asked to speak on the behalf of Resolutions coming before this convention.

Committee on the Dispatch of Business

The Bishop appointed the Committee on the Dispatch of Business: (1 clerical, 1 lay delegate) The Rev. Ken Pepin and Elizabeth Marlowe from Grace Scottsville/St. Andrew's Caledonia.

Dispatch of Business

The Bishop called upon the Rev. Ken Pepin, Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, to move the agenda for the Convention. **MSP**

Rules of Debate

The Bishop called upon the Rev. Ken Pepin, Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, to move the Convention Rules of Debate as follows:

- that all speakers must identify themselves by name, congregation and organization
- that no more than 15 minutes be devoted to each question, including amendments and substitutions
- that the sponsor and first opponent limit themselves to three minutes and all speakers thereafter are limited to two minutes

The rules of debate may be amended or extended during debate by a <u>simple majority</u> vote, if desired. Delegates were reminded that motions, amendments and substitutions should be presented to the Secretary in writing with the name and congregation of the mover, using the form found in the packets.**MSP**

Appointment of a Timekeeper

The Bishop appointed the Rev. Jimmie Sue Deppe, as Timekeeper.

Correspondence to Be Read at Convention

The Secretary reported that correspondence was received in September 2016 in a DFMS "Mailing to all Dioceses" - from the Rev. Canon Dr. Michael Barlowe, Secretary of the House of Deputies and Secretary of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church - To the Bishops and Secretaries of Diocesan Conventions - concerning Deputy Selection for General Convention 2018 – The entire document has been posted on the website and filed with the Secretary of Convention. The required information regarding election of Deputies to the 79th General Convention will be filed following the elections at this Convention. The additional requests cited in the correspondence need no further action of this Convention at this time.

Acceptance of Reports

The Bishop asked for acceptance of the reports of the Commission on Ministry, the Trustees, the Diocesan Council, the Standing Committee and other official reports as posted on the website prior to Convention. **MSP**

The Bishop announced the appointments to the Standing Committees for the 85th Convention and expressed thanks for their service.

Resolution C: Resolution for 2016 Amendments to Constitution and Canons

The Bishop called upon the Rev. Dr. Peter Peters, Chair of the Committee on Resolutions to present a resolution for change in the Constitution and Canons. Peter noted he would ask the Chancellor, Philip Fileri, Chair of Constitution & Canons, to present Resolution C and explained that procedurally, in order for the canonical changes to become immediately effective, and not to require the approval by majority vote of two successive Diocesan Conventions, such changes must be adopted by a two-thirds vote in each Order at this Diocesan Convention.

The Chancellor presented Resolution C as follows:



RESOLUTION: 2016 Amendments to Constitution and Canons

RESOLVED, that the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester ("Canons") be amended as set forth in the attached compared version of the Canons, dated August 19, 2016.

EXPLANATION:

The proposed changes are summarized in the attached Memorandum from the Constitution and Canons Committee, dated August 18, 2016 (the "Memo").

With the exception of two subsequently approved changes, the changes were approved and recommended by the Committee at its May 16, 2016 meeting.

The Committee was tasked to review the timelines and notice requirements in the Canons with a view toward shortening them in light of the rise of electronic communication and delivery. Input was received from clergy and diocesan staff regarding timing, time requirements to accomplish necessary tasks, and what would be reasonable schedules for parishes and staff to carry on the work of the Diocese. Thus, changes are intended to be procedural and are not intended to affect the rights and responsibilities of parties.

The two subsequently approved matters are adding a provision to require the Diocese to have a Human Resources Committee and permitting the Secretary of the Diocese to delegate certain tasks.

Under the Bishop's authority to run the Diocese, the Diocese has had an HR Committee for a long time. This now provides canonical authority for it.

The duties of the Secretary of the Diocese are substantial. With Susan Woodhouse ending her tenure as Secretary (and we heartily thank her for that!), thought is being given to restructuring the Secretary positon to provide for two individuals, one serving as the Secretary of the Diocese, and another being delegated and performing the responsibilities of secretary to Diocesan Council. The amendment provides the authority for this delegation and makes clear that it is permissible.

RE: Revision to Episcopal Diocese of Rochester Constitution and Canons - 2016

Proposed Amendments

This memo summarizes the proposed changes to the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester Constitution and Canons, as recommended and approved by the Constitution and Canons Committee at its May 16, 2016 meeting.

- 1. **Constitution, Art. V, Section 3**. The requirement that the Registrar be a "communicant in good standing" is deleted. Since the Secretary and Treasurer are not required to be "communicant in good standing", it seems this requirement should not be imposed on the Registrar, which is substantially a recordkeeping position. The Bishop may appoint the Registrar at any time and advise the Convention of the appointment at the next following Convention.
- 2. Article VIII, Section 1(a). This section has been deleted. It required that if a vacancy in the Episcopate occurs within 30 to 90 days before the Diocesan Convention, that the Convention elect a Bishop. It also required that if that does not occur, within 30 days of the vacancy a date for a special Convention for that purpose be announced. Neither of these of the timeframes are workable given the current processes for discerning and electing a Bishop.
- 3. **Article IX**. The requirement that amendments to the Constitution be submitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons 90 days in advance of Diocesan Convention has been reduced to 60 days.
- 4. Canon 3, Convention Elections.

A new Section 4(a) is added and the balance of the subsections are re-lettered. The new subsection sets forth a procedure for the Nominating Committee to recommend to Diocesan Council for its approval a timetable for the nominating process. This will permit the "Spring" schedule, which has been tried this year, to be established and for its time submission dates to be binding, provided they are not shorter than the Canonical time limits.

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> New Section 4(c), old 4(b), requires nominations to be in at least 45 days before Diocesan Convention. If the Spring nominating process is not used, this reduces the nomination submission requirement from 60 days to 45 days. This shorter process recognizes the shorter amount of time needed to communicate electronically rather than by mail. So under this shorter process, notice of vacancies go out at least 90 days in advance of convention as before, nominations are required at least 45 days in advance of Convention giving parishes added time, and the nominations information must be disseminated at least 30 days in advance of Convention as before and as needed for District meetings. In other words, the 90/60/30 day timeframes are changed to 90/45/30 days. Also, by way of example, with a Convention on November 5, under the existing canonical provision nominations are due September 5. Under the new canonical provision, nominations would be due September 20, which would give parishes time to return form the summer season and essentially have two weeks to focus on the nominations task. The Committee believes this is a significant difference for parishes.

The language in New Section 4(e), old 4(d), is revised slightly to remove a reference to a brochure and instead indicate nominee profiles "will be made available", presumably electronically by an email and on the Diocesan website rather than through a printed paper brochure.

New Section 4(g), old 4(f), is revised to reflect that costs may pertain to mailing and/or distribution by other means, such as electronic communication. The terms "profiles" and "Convention materials" are used in place of "brochure", which implies a paper booklet.

Section 5 is modified to delete references to mailing, since notification may be given electronically. The time periods are still calculated from the date of sending of the notification.

5. Canon 6, Section 2, Diocesan Council

The errant language in the first line of "the Bishop of" is deleted.

In Canon 6.2(b)(1) the time by which to notify the Secretary of District representatives is reduced from 90 days prior to Convention to 30 days.

6. Canon 6, Section 4, secretary for Diocesan Council.

An additional sentence is added to permit an individual other than the Secretary to serve as the "secretary" of Diocesan Council. Susan Woodhouse will be stepping down at the end of her term this year. Because of the magnitude of the duties, consideration is being given to electing a Secretary of the Diocese to perform the

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traditional Canon 2.1 functions and then selecting another individual to serve as the recording Secretary of Council. There is nothing in the current Canons that would prevent this, but this language makes it clear that this approach may be used.

7. Canon 9, Section 1(g), Business Methods.

After the departure of a rector or priest-in-charge, an audit of the parish's accounts is performed. Depending upon the departure date of the rector or priest-in-charge, such as in the fall, a parish will often request that the audit be deferred for month or two and be performed on the calendar fiscal year. The Diocese often will agree to this if there are no concerns regarding the circumstances at the time of the rector's departure. The language is revised to permit this practice. In addition, this audit requirement has been made applicable to the departure of a priest-in-charge, not just a rector, since many parishes now have a priest-in-charge serving for a reasonable period of time.

8. Canon 9 Section 1(j), Business Methods, Human Resources Committee.

A new subsection 9.1(j) is added as authority for the Diocese's Human Resources Committee. The Diocese has an HR committee for a long time. Although the Bishop has the authority to establish positions and committees as necessary to run the Diocese, it is thought that a canonical basis for the HR Committee should be added

9. Canon 17.3(i)(1), The Parish Organization.

The reference to "Title 1, Canon 7, Section 1(b)" is amended to delete "Section 1(b)" since the relevant language is now in Section 3.

10. Canon 17.3(i)(9).

The time for submitting a proposed parish bylaw, bylaw amendment, or amendment of the Certificate of Incorporation to the Chancellor is reduced form 60 days to 30 days, prior to its publication at a meeting. Technical changes are made to this Section's references to bylaws and amendments thereto. Also, amendments to a parish's Certificate of Incorporation are added as documents that must be reviewed by the Chancellor.

11. Canon 20, Section 4, Diocesan Societies and Institutions.

The time for submitting a certificate of Incorporation and new By-Laws to the Chancellor is reduced from 90 to 60 days prior to the Convention in which approval is sought. Throughout sections 3 and 4, and the Canons as a whole, clerical changes are made such that references to Articles of Incorporation are

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changed to Certificate of Incorporation, the correct term in New York State. Also, "By-Laws", "By-laws", "Bylaws" and "bylaws" are now consistently styled "By-Laws".

12. Canon 21, Ecclesiastical Discipline.

By its terms, Section 2(b)(2), the introductory initial staggered term procedure provision is to be deleted form the canons effective December 31, 2014. Accordingly, this Section is now deleted, and former Section 2(a)(3) is renumbered 2(a)(2).

13. Canon 28, Interpretation of Canons

A new section is added to deal with electronic communication. While the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law permits such electronic communication, the Committee thought it would be helpful to state in the Canons that meetings may be held, in whole or in part, by telephone conference call, and that notices, consents, signatures, etc. may be given by e-mail.

The Bishop called upon the Chancellor to present an amendment to the Constitution and Canon Committee recommendation. Phil suggested that Canon 6 Section 4 (page 19) be revised to read, "with the approval of the Secretary and Bishop" and spoke to the resolution.

The Bishop called for a vote on the amendment. MSP

The Bishop called for a vote on the resolution by orders reminding delegates that the Canons require that 5 members of the Convention must request a vote by orders. The Bishop then asked for a show of hands to request a vote by orders. Seeing the required number of hands, he called the vote. Resolution C, as amended, was approved by a vote of 2/3 in each order. **MSP**

Close of the First Business Session:

The first business session closed at 8:50 a.m. for a procession to Trinity Church for the celebration of the Eucharist to be followed by lunch at HWS.

The Bishop recognized Ms. Bliss Owen, Assistant Treasurer of the Diocese, to present and move the audit report. Bliss thanked the audit committee of the Trustees and the audit firm, Mengel, Metzger & Barr LLC, for their oversight of the process. She provided an overview of the report and the resolution to accept the audit was approved as follows. The entire Audit Report is included in a separate section of the Journal and available on the diocesan website.

Resolution B: Dissolution of St. Paul's Montour Falls as a Mission

The Bishop called upon Gwen Van Laeken, Vice-chair of Diocesan Council, to move **Resolution B: Dissolution of St. Paul's Montour Falls as a Mission.** The Rev. Michael Hartney and others spoke in support of the resolution and thanked the Diocese for the creative solution. The Bishop called for a vote and the resolution was approved as follows. **MSP**



Dissolution of St. Paul's, Montour Falls as a Mission Proposer: Diocesan Council (Rule of Order 21 (a))

Resolved, that this 85th convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester, meeting in Geneva, New York, on November 5, 2016, upon the receipt of the recommendation of a majority of the members of the Diocesan Council, meeting in regular session on October 18, 2016, and in accordance with the Canons of the Diocese of Rochester, declares that the Mission known as **St. Paul's, Montour Falls** is dissolved, that its executive committee is dissolved and that its assets be dedicated in accordance with the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Explanation:

In 2004 St. Paul's request to move from parish to mission status was approved by Convention. In 2007 the church building was sold, and the congregation continued to meet in the Parish Hall. The congregation has since declined and for some time now the few remaining members of St. Paul's worship at St. James, Watkins Glen. Though there is no longer a worshiping congregation at St. Paul's, the Parish Hall continues to operate as community meeting place and Episcopal presence in the Village of Montour Falls. However, St. Paul's is still paying assessments & apportionments, maintaining an Executive Committee, with regular meetings and providing annual parochial reports & audits. By dissolving St. Paul's as a canonical entity ("Mission of the Diocese") and having the Vestry of St. James, Watkins Glen provide oversight of the day-to-day maintenance of the Parish Hall, the service to the community can continue without undue administrative and operational burdens. The Diocese continues to be legal owners of all the property of St. Paul's and will work with the Trustees and the Vestry of St. James to provide:

- Annual funding to cover utilities and maintenance of the Parish Hall at Montour Falls
- Adequate property & liability insurance coverage
- Appropriate funding for major capital improvements or repairs

Second Ballot

The Bishop called upon the Chaplain for prayer and then upon the Rev, Andrew Van Buren for the result of the second ballot for the fourth Clerical Deputy to General Convention. Since there was no majority, there was no election. The Chancellor advised the delegates that there would be a third ballot and the person with the most votes would be elected. The Chief Teller led the delegates through the electronic voting process and the Bishop declared the polls closed.

Resolution A: Grace Church Lyons

The Bishop called upon Gwen Van Laeken, Vice-chair of Diocesan Council, to move **Resolution A: Grace Church Lyons**. The Rev. Canon Julie Cicora and Mrs. Barbara Deming spoke about the history and work of RMM (Rural Migrant Ministry) and several persons spoke in support of the resolution. The Bishop called for a vote and the resolution was approved as follows. **MSP**



Grace Church - Lyons- Diocesan Convention Resolution 11-5-16

Whereas, Grace Episcopal Church is a long-standing incorporated Episcopal parish located at 9 Phelps St, Lyons, NY 14489 ("Grace Church");

Whereas, Grace Church holds significant assets consisting of a church building, rectory and parish hall, all on the historical register, certain bank and investment accounts, beneficiary status to certain trusts, dedicated parishioners, and a tradition of religious, missional and community service ("Church Resources").

Whereas, for approximately a five-year period Grace Church has made available certain of its Church Resources working with Rural & Migrant Ministry ("RMM") to support RMM's activities bringing the word and blessings of God to the rural, migrant, farmworker, and Hispanic communities in the region.

Whereas, in early 2016 the congregation of Grace Church, under the leadership of The Rev. Andrew D'Angio White, determined that the demographics of the region no longer supported the traditional parish model for Grace Church and that Grace church should look to transition its activities by the end of 2016.

Whereas, since that time Grace Church, including its Priest, Wardens and Vestry, have had discussions with the Diocese, including Bishop Singh, Chief Financial Officer Rubiano and Chancellor Fileri, and RMM, including RMM Board Chair the Rev. Julie Cicora and RMM Executive Director the Rev. Richard Witt, about charting a new course. These discussions resulted in a proposal from RMM to Grace Church presented to Grace Church in August, 2016, supported by the Diocese, to transition Grace Church to incorporated mission status, and as a Diocesan mission, to engage in joint activities with RMM, pursuant to a proposal, the current status of which is attached hereto ("Proposal"), using certain of the Grace Church Resources and gifts to continue and grow RMM's activities in the Lyons region.

Whereas, the Wardens and Vestry of Grace Church have approved the Proposal and the matters in these resolutions set forth below.

NOW, THEREFORE, this Convention hereby adopts the following resolutions:

RESOLVED, that as of the Transition Date (defined below) Grace Church ecclesiastically shall transition from "parish" status to "mission" status in the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester. The Wardens and Vestry of Grace Church shall no longer have their duties and responsibilities for Grace Church effective on the Transition Date. As a mission, the Diocese shall be responsible for the Grace Church Resources and assets as governed by the applicable Constitution & Canons provisions. Grace Church shall be an incorporated mission and continue its religious tax-exempt status. Its assets, while subject to Diocesan ownership, control and direction shall remain assets of the Grace Church incorporated entity, unless determined otherwise by the Diocese.

RESOLVED, that the Convention hereby:

- (a) applauds Grace Church for its many, many years of successful parish ministry, outstanding stewardship of its resources and gifts, and vision to continue a legacy of helping those who need help and extending its gifts beyond itself both geographically and in time into the future.
- (b) approves and supports the Diocese engaging with RMM for rural and migrant ministry arising out of Grace Church, as may be reasonably modified from time to time with the approval of the Bishop,

(c) thanks all involved for their diligent and inspired work in developing the vision for this important work and melding the Grace Church Resources with an implementation plan for this growing ministry, and

RESOLVED, that the Transition Date be such date as agreed to by the Diocese and Grace Church, but not later than December 31, 2016.

RESOLVED, that the Bishop and the Officers of the Diocese are hereby authorized to take such actions as may be necessary, appropriate and/or advisable to implement the resolutions set forth above, including but not limited to establishing, modifying and/or terminating an arrangement with RMM and taking such steps as may be needed to operate the Grace Church mission, including but not limited to establishing an Executive Committee and delegating responsibilities to an administrative board or otherwise.

Explanation

The background and reasons for the actions are detailed in the "Whereas" clauses above.

Diocesan Council

The Bishop called upon Gwen Van Laeken, Vice-chair of Diocesan Council, who acknowledged the work of the Council over the past year, recognized its working committees (Congregational Development Partnership committee (CDPC), Mission Partnership Grant Committee (MPGC), Budget) and introduced the members – thanking them for their contributions.

Diocesan Council: Congregational Development Partnership Committee

Deb Vanderbilt and the Rev. Chris Streeter, Co-chairs of the committee, gave an overview of the work of the CDPC. Their overview and the history of the work of CDPC led to investigation of a College for Congregational Development as a relevant and necessary component to the work around congregational development. They introduced the Rev. Paul Frolick who provided an overview of the proposed College.

College for Congregational Development

Paul provided some background to the proposed College. Paul, the Rev. Chris Streeter, the Rev. Winifred Collin and Mrs. Sarah Peters each attended a session of the current college offered by Diocese of Olympia Washington. Each of those participants spoke to the quality and relevance of the program noting "the value it has already been helpful to parish"; "the most well run, well organized, content filled and valuable on/to many levels/groups" and "spectacular - offering organizational models to help identify new ways forward - tools that give hope for the future". Paul reviewed a PowerPoint presentation that provided detail regarding the offering proposed for the Diocese of Rochester beginning in July 2017.

Diocesan Council: Mission Partnership Grant Committee

Margy Ashley, Co-chair of the committee, provided an overview of the work of the committee over the past year. She offered special thanks to Kristy Estey for her support and also to Scott Seabridge, the other Co-chair for his contributions.

Diocesan Council: Budget

Gwen introduced Scott Seabridge, Chair of the Budget Committee who provided a short report on the process used by the committee used to create the budget, the work of the committee highlighting the review of the apportionment formula, discernment on Province II and creation of the 2017 budget. He then introduced Todd Rubiano, CFO, to present the budget.

Presentation of the 2017 Diocesan Budget

Todd presented a series of PowerPoint slides to provide a thorough review of the proposed 2017 budget. The Bishop then recognized Gwen Van Laeken to make a motion on behalf of the Diocesan Council for the approval of the 2017 budget. Discussion followed and the Rev. Michael Hartney introduced an amendment to increase the Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) line item by \$19,200 to \$60,200, raising the HRA funding to \$900 per eligible retiree this year. Michael and several others spoke in support of the amendment. Following extensive conversation, the Bishop called for a voice vote on the amendment which was inconclusive. He then asked for a vote by show of hands. The amendment carried. **MSP**

Conversation continued regarding passing a balanced budget and raised the question of where the \$19K would be taken from. Chancellor, Phil Fileri, responded to a question of whether the Canons require the passing of a balanced budget noting that they do not, and that Council would then have the responsibility of making that decision. Gwen Van Laeken proposed an amendment to balance the proposed budget by taking \$19K from the Mission Grant funds account – some from funds which are currently unallocated and the remainder from grants funds. The motion was seconded, spoken to, a vote was called, and the motion was defeated. The original budget as amended was restated with the reminder that the budget amendment creates a \$19,200 budget deficit for 2017, which will be addressed by Diocesan Council. The amended 2017 budget was approved as follows.

The Proposed 2017 Budget and the approved 2017 Budget as amended are included in a separate section of the Journal and available on the diocesan website.

Resolved, that the 85th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester approves the 2017 Diocesan Budget of \$2,072,851, as amended to increase the Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) line item by \$19,200 to \$60,200, raising the HRA funding to \$900 per eligible retiree for 2017. The resulting \$19,200 budget deficit for 2017 will be addressed by Diocesan Council." **MSP**

The Bishop called upon the Chaplain for prayer.

Third Ballot

The Bishop called upon the Chief Teller, the Rev. Andrew Van Buren, to provide the result of the third ballot. Andrew announced that the Rev. Chris Streeter was elected as the fourth Clerical Deputy to General Convention.

2017 COMPENSATION POLICY & BUDGETING GUIDELINES

RE: 2017 Compensation Policy & Budgeting Guidelines:

As you review these compensation policies, we encourage you to review the **Diocesan Employee Handbook** (available on our Diocesan web site). The handbook was designed to help our churches provide consistent and appropriate HR policies and practices.

STAFF SALARY RANGES:

Enclosed are salary ranges for clergy and lay staff positions in 2017. Please carefully review job descriptions for all *lay staff* positions to insure full **compliance with Federal & State requirements under the <u>Fair Labor Standards Act</u> (<u>FLSA</u>). These regulations provide minimum wage, over-time compensation requirements and the criteria for defining positions as either "Exempt" or "Non-exempt". Remember that all employees, no matter how part-time, should be on a payroll service and must receive a W-2.**

Each year, Vestries should review staff performance (relative to expectations and salary range) and make appropriate salary adjustments. Annual salary reviews are critical to retaining & recruiting the best staff. Vestries should continue to move compensation for experienced, well performing staff towards the upper half of the appropriate salary range. The most recent local wage surveys indicate that increases of about 3% are appropriate for staff in 2017.

HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFITS:

For 2017 the Diocese will offer the same seven CPG Medical Plans offered in 2016. Please note that our High Deductible Health Plans, have been renamed Consumer Directed Health Plans (CDHP).

Our *minimum employer medical insurance subsidies* for 2017 will increase by about 3.5 % and cover an average of 92% of the premiums of our four lower cost plans. This is an opportune time for staff to carefully consider which plan provides the best balance between coverage and cost.

For 2017 the same three CPG/CIGNA Dental Plans introduced in 2016 will be available. All eligible employees (clergy & lay): scheduled to work at least 1,500 hours annually, must be offered dental coverage, with a *minimum employer subsidy* equal to 50% of the lowest cost plan for single, two person or family coverage. The proposed Diocesan Budget moves the responsibility for funding these minimum employer subsidies to churches for 2017.

2017 PARISH APPORTIONMENT:

<u>Enclosed is a chart of 2017 apportionments</u> included in our proposed operating budget. Additional details regarding apportionment rates, income ranges and "caps and floors" may be found under the Convention section of the Diocesan web site. CLERGY SALARY RANGES:

The Diocesan Clergy Salary Ranges below reflect an increase of 2-3% for most church size categories (church "size" is based on Average Sunday Attendance - ASA). These changes are based on the most recent clergy compensation survey provided by the Church Pension Group (CPG) and analysis of peer diocese completed by the HR Committee, Bishop & Staff. These are the first increases to clergy salary ranges since we moved to the CPG church size structure three years ago.

• If a rectory is provided, the parish must obtain an estimate of the fair market value (FMV) for rental of the property and may then reduce cash salary by that amount. Please note that the calculation for clergy pension changes when a rectory is provided.

SUPPLY CLERGY RATES: Rates for Supply Clergy will remain at the same levels for 2017.

In addition, supply clergy should be reimbursed for mileage from home to the church and back at the IRS standard mileage rate.

IRS MILEAGE RATES:

The current IRS standard mileage rate is 54 cents per mile. We will communicate any changes as soon as they are announced.

RECOMMENDED WAGES FOR LAY PARISH EMPLOYEES:

Wage ranges for lay staff positions are difficult to standardize due to the wide range of job descriptions, education, skills and experience in these positions. In addition, there are geographic differences in the local job markets across the Diocese. Hourly wage rates below are structured to accommodate for these variances. Rectors and supervisors should clarify job descriptions/expectations and then use local data sources to align compensation for each specific role with that of the local community.

The chart below provides pay ranges that are appropriate for our Diocese. Depending on the job expectations (Level I-III) education, skills, experience, geographic differences in the cost of living and level of benefits provided - individual compensation may vary.

The wage rates below DO NOT include payroll taxes or required health & pension benefits.

LAY PENSION BENEFITS:

Resolution A138 of the 2009 General Convention requires that all lay employees scheduled to work 1,000 hours or more annually be provided with a lay pension plan administered and designed by The Church Pension Fund (CPF). For defined contribution plans, employers must contribute not less than 5% of the employee's compensation AND also match (on a dollar-for-dollar basis) not less than 4% of compensation. Therefore, an employee that contributes 4% of their own pay would receive another 9% from the employer, for a total contribution of 13%. This resolution forms the minimum requirement that applies to all employers within the Diocese of Rochester.

Effective 01/01/15, the Diocese recommended that all employers contribute 8% of the employee's salary as the *employer base contribution* and up to an additional 4% *employer matching contribution*. This policy results in a 12% maximum employer contribution for employees that contribute 4% or more to their own plan. Employers may elect to "migrate" to this higher level of benefit by changing the base contribution by 1% point, per year until they reach 8% *employer base contribution* – while still maintaining the 4% *employer matching contribution*.

MEDICAL INSURANCE - EMPLOYER SUBSIDY:

The 77th General Convention reaffirmed that all parishes and missions are to be enrolled in the Episcopal Church Medical Trust and that parity in cost-sharing shall be achieved between clergy and lay employees by December 31st, 2015. All lay and clergy employees scheduled to work 1,500 hours or more annually must be offered these medical insurance benefits.

The *minimum employer medical insurance subsidies* for full-time employees in 2017 are:

- Employees are responsible to pay the difference in cost between the plan they select and the employer subsidy.
- The employer subsidy may be pro-rated for part-time employees, based on the full time subsidies shown above.
- Increasing benefits above the pro-rated amount is at the discretion of the Parish.
- Cost sharing for medical insurance must be the same for all eligible lay and clergy employees.

In addition, Federal regulations require that employers offer the same medical insurance plans to all employees (even those over age 65) who are scheduled to work a minimum of 1,000 hours annually, OR who are paid more than \$455 per week. The employee may decline coverage if, for example, they are covered under a spouse's employer. But, the parish may not provide any incentives for the employee to refuse coverage (i.e. paying for alternative medical coverage). Any such payments may violate IRS regulations. If an employee has a legitimate basis for declining coverage, they should sign the attached waiver.

DENTAL INSURANCE:

For 2017, it is expected that church employers will provide the "employer dental subsidy" detailed below for all eligible employees (clergy & lay) scheduled to work at least 1,500 hours annually. The minimum employer dental subsidy is equal to 50% of the lowest cost plan for single, two person or family coverage.

The remaining premium is paid by participants through payroll deduction.

GROUP LIFE INSURANCE:

Clergy who currently participate in the Church Pension Fund receive life insurance coverage of up to \$100,000, as long as pension assessments are paid. If a priest is not canonically resident in a diocese of the Episcopal Church and cannot participate in the Church Pension Fund, the congregation is required to purchase the same level of coverage as that provided by the Church Pension Fund.

Group Life Insurance up to \$50,000 is available to lay parish staff through the Diocesan group policy with Church Life Insurance. Please contact Kristy Estey for coverage and cost information.

DISABILITY INSURANCE:

Clergy who currently participate in the Church Pension Fund receive short term disability coverage (up to 12 months) as long as pension assessments are paid. If a priest is not canonically resident in a diocese of the Episcopal Church and cannot participate in the Church Pension Fund, the congregation is required to purchase the same of coverage as that provided by the Church Pension Fund.


Clergy are also exempt from mandatory New York State Disability Insurance (NYSDI). Therefore, there is no need for parishes to pay for NYSDI on behalf of clergy that are already covered through their Church Pension Fund assessments. All other parish staff must be covered by NYSDI.

In addition, ALL clergy and lay staff should consider their individual need for additional short and long term disability coverage as part of their personal financial planning.

Summary of Diocesan Council Minutes: November 2015-October 2016

The agenda for each Diocesan Council meeting is prepared by the Steering Committee of Council and adopted at each Council meeting. In addition to the monthly summaries listed in this report, regular business at Council meetings includes:

- Meditation and prayer
- Approval of the Agenda/Consent Agenda (as prepared and presented by the Council Steering Committee)
- Approval of Minutes
- Highlights from the Bishop's Activities
- Budget and Finance Reports, including the year-to-date status of parish apportionments for approval subject to audit
- Reports to Diocesan Council from diocesan committees, staff and Council members
- Reports by working sub-committees of Council: Congregational Development Partnership Committee

(CDPC), Mission Partnership Grants Committee (MPGC) and Budget Committee

November 2015: Due to the closeness of the meeting date to Convention, the first regular meeting of Council was planned for December.

A **Special Meeting** was held on November 10, 2015 to address a concern related to the HRA allocation in the proposed2016budget (proposed *Resolution A: Diocesan Health Benefits*). Following discussion, Council passed a motion to withdraw Resolution A. **MSP**

Following passage of that motion, the Budget Committee presented a proposal for the amendment of the 2016 budget to fund an increase to the HRA budget for one year. Discussion followed and the following resolution was adopted by council:

Resolution: To increase HRA funding to \$900 per person for 2016 only (\$19K) by decreasing unallocated mission grant funds (\$11,450) and office expenses (\$7,550). **MSP**

December 15, 2015:

The Bishop and Council welcomed new members and members met briefly with committees. Gwen Van Laeken was elected as Vice-chair of Council. **MSP**

Committee chairs gave an overview of their committee's work and introduced members. The Council Norms and Expectations were introduced and reviewed.

Committee Updates:

Congregational Development Partnership Committee -CDPC: A resolution for funding for St. Marks & St. Johns was introduced. Following discussion, there solution was approved as follows:

RESOLVED: Diocesan Council approves a Congregational Development Partnership Grant for St. Mark's and St. John's Episcopal Church, Rochester of \$15,000 total for the year 2016. Disbursement will be monthly beginning in January 2016. **MSP**

January 19, 2016:

The Canon for Mission and Ministry, Julie Cicora, shared news of her upcoming change in careers. She will become the Interim President of Rural Migrant Ministry's Board of Directors and will pursue a part-time clerical position focusing on evangelism.

Committee Updates:

Congregational Development Partnership Committee – CDPC, Mission Partnership Grant Committee – MPGC and Budget Committees provided updates on the work and processes of their committees.

February 24, 2016

The February meeting was cancelled due to inclement weather.

March 15, 2016

Diocesan House Update:

Todd discussed the study on the future of D House noting that the Trustees have been studying the issue for the past year.

Committee Updates:

Congregational Development Partnership Committee -CDPC: Chris/Deb presented two resolutions for approval- St. Luke's Brockport and Christ Church Rochester. Following discussion, each resolution was approved as follows:

St. Luke's Brockport

RESOLVED: Diocesan Council approves a Congregational Development Partnership Grant for St. Luke's

Episcopal Church, Brockport of \$18,000 for the year 2016. Disbursement will be monthly and retroactive to January 2016. **MSP**

Christ Church Rochester

RESOLVED: Diocesan Council approves a Congregational Development Partnership Grant for Christ Church, Rochester of \$5,000 for the year 2016. Disbursement will be quarterly in March, June September & December. **MSP 1 abstention**

Mission Partnership Grant Committee –MPGC: Margy reported that application for Mission Grants will go live on the web in April. The group will meet in Julytore view the 2016 applications.

Budget Committee: Scott led an apportionment rate discussion. Council consensus was to stay with the current apportionment formula at this time.

Financial Updates:

YE 2015 Budget Performance

Todd reported that total operating expense for 2015 will be ~\$120K below budget noting that YE figures will not be final until the 2015 audit is complete.

Budget and Draw Year End Estimates:

Todd indicated that the draw on the investments has reduced dramatically over last 5 years and noted an accounting change moving forward. Since the budget should reflect actual expense for the year, there will be no more accrual over several budget years as in the past.

2017-19 Preliminary Draw and Budget Projections

Todd reported that the Trustees have approved a preliminary draw of \$1.1M for 2017 and reviewed a slide that detailed projections through 2020.

April 19, 2016

The Bishop noted that the parochial reports have been received and, using some of the data, he offered a "state of the diocese" update relating to the mission statement and referencing some of the numerical data. Using a power point presentation, he shared some visual data, cited trends and observations that can be considered and noted that re-visioning seems to be having an effect.

Nominating Committee Resolution:

Since Council is charged with creating the Diocesan Nominating Committee, Gwen presented a resolution to fulfill that task. Following review, the resolution was approved as follows:

Financial Updates:

2017 Proposed Apportionment:

Todd and Scott reviewed apportionment data including the cap and floor and trend over last few years and noted the potential impact on several parishes for the 2017 budget year. Following discussion, Council approved the following resolution:

RESOLVED: Diocesan Council proposes 2017 Parish Apportionment of \$973,151, using the same income ranges, rates, caps and floors as applied in 2016, and as detailed in the accompanying charts (included in council packet). **MSP**

Todd presented a preliminary first draft budget proposal for FY 2017 noting there are many options. Discussion followed and the first draft will be presented to council in May.

May 17, 2016

The Bishop spoke to the sudden death of Lisa Bodenstadt, former Interim Director of The Good Book Store. He also updated Council on the discernment of Trustees regarding D House suggesting that the study has been about asking stewardship questions, what God is doing in our midst and more about networking and less about centralizing. There will be dialogue as things move ahead.

South Wedge Mission Update:

TheRev.MatthewNickoloffwaswelcomedandsharedinformationaboutthemission. He suggested that the intentionhasbeentoformtheneighborhoodintoaparishwithemphasisonlivingintomission. They are now at the three-year point and are working with the Diocese and the LCA toward a church plant as a mission.

Financial Updates:

First Draft Budget Proposal – FY 2017:

Todd reviewed a 1st draft budget for 2017 showing a \$38K deficit and reviewed the issues related to the deficit: D&FMS Asking, Province II Assessment and Parish Dental Subsidy. He reminded Council that the idea of a first draft is to flush out the input/questions and that the budget for 2017 will not reflect any potential changes related to the possible selling of property. Once Council approves the draft, it can be circulated across the diocese for feedback.

Following discussion, Council approved the following resolution to adopt the first draft budget to be circulated with a letter of explanation of the process and year-to-year comparisons to emphasize transparency.

Resolved: Diocese Council approves distribution of the 1st draft 2017 Diocesan Operating Budget, with total Operating expenses of \$2,058,763 and an Operating deficit of \$37,611, for feedback from the Convention Delegates, Parish & Diocesan Leaders. **MSP**

June 21, 2016

Committee Updates:

Mission Partnership Grant Committee—MPGC: Margy reported that there were 37 applications to the committee requesting approximately \$242,500. Sustainable grants are still open. Grant applications will be reviewed next week.

Congregational Development Partnership Committee -CDPC: Chris/Deb reported that parishes are almost all requesting more than was in their plans, which would be significantly over budget (about 70K) and there will be difficult decisions to be made.

Budget/Province II Discussion: Scott reported on Province II assessment discernment process noting that the budget for Province II went up 75% over 3 years, and there was very little explanation. Provincial executive position pay increased significantly. Networks & Other Programs increased by 414%. Discussion followed and Council identified three options:

- 1) Continue with requested assessment payment
- 2) Pay this year but go down to previous assessment amount for next 2 years
- 3) Pay the previous assessment amount (\$3355 an amount assumed to have been passed in previous triennial budget) this year by taking it out of 2017 payment. **Option 3 adopted. MSP**

Executive Session:

Council voted to enter executive session to discuss an audit report from Zion-Avon. Following executive session,

a previous resolution related to Zion Avon was amended to say "which has been approved by their Vestry" after the words "letter" In the bullet list under August 15, 2016. **MSP**

September 20, 2016:

Committee Members: A number of outside members served on sub-committees, strengthening the committees and bringing more representation from a broad group of congregations. Included were: *Human Resources Committee outside members*: Elizabeth Bakken, Sherry Ralston, John Karl, and Amy Moyer. *Investment Review Committee outside members*: William McKee, Greg VanLaeken, Peter Greaves-Tunnell and John Johnson. *Audit and Finance Committee outside member:* Aaron Kane. *Building and Property:* Jay Benesh, Richard Krapf and Tom Judson, *Prichard Scholarship outside members:* Marti St. George and Madeline Carpenter-Burke.

Structure: The Diocesan Trustees are supported by a number of standing Sub-Committees, including the Investment Review Committee, the Audit Committee, the Building & Property Committee, the Prichard Scholarship Committee and the Human Resources Committee. In addition to the four scheduled Trustee meetings, the Trustees continue to look for opportunities to collaborate with the Standing Committee, Diocesan Council and the Commission on Ministry. Actions of the Trustees and all Sub-committees are found in the minutes of the Trustees located in the office of the Diocese. Committee meetings took place several times during the year.

Audit Committee:

A significant portion of the work of the Trustees is to complete canonical requirements including the Diocesan Audit and assisting with parish audits.

In the fall of 2015, the Audit committee requested RFP's for a new three year contract to conduct the audit for the Diocese. The Bonadio Group provided valuable counsel and support for many years as our Diocesan audit firm, and they were invited to participate in the RFP process. The committee received four proposals, including one from The Bonadio Group, who was our auditor for the past five years. Mengel Metzger Barr& Co., LLP(MMB)submitted the most cost effective proposal, and was highly qualified. Accordingly, the committee recommended and the Trustees approved engaging MMB for the new contract. MMB conducted the audit of the finances and assets of the Diocese for 2015. At its meeting of September 7, the Trustees unanimously passed a resolution to accept the 2015 Diocesan

Audit and move the audit to Convention for review and approval. The audit is available for review on the Diocesan web-site.

Building and Property Committee:

The Building and Property Committee met several times over the course of the year. The committee worked on the following properties and assessed the requirements of each:

- Ardent Solutions partnership, enhancing the ministry in Belmont, NY
- Plans for Church Insurance inspections of 12 parish properties in 2016
- Future disposition of properties in Bolivar and Belvidere, NY
- Discernment on the future use of D-House

Investment Review Committee:

The current Investment Policy Statement (IPS adopted February 3rd, 2014) for funds invested in the Combined Endowment was reviewed and approved for its continued use by the Trustees. The Cutler Trusts were legally dissolved and the assets incorporated into the Combined Endowment, primarily as a restricted fund, providing more efficient management of the investments.

The portfolio performance since management was moved to Genesee Valley Trust (GVT) on 12/01/11 was an average annual return of 8.2% through July 2016. This performance is somewhat behind our benchmark; however, returns are ahead of our IPS goal of 6.5%. GVT rectified the issues with their sub accounting reporting and have gone with a much simplified unitized method. Continued upgrades to the reporting will be introduced in the 4th Quarter of 2016.

The Trustees continued efforts to ensure that the loan balances are in line with the current endowment level. The total balance of outstanding loans was just over \$2.4 M. as of 12/31/15, with loan capacity going into 4^{th} Quarter of 2016 is over \$550,000.

Trustees discussed resolution CO39 from General Convention regarding fossil fuel divestment & clean energy reinvestment and determined that it was neither practical or prudent to alter the current investment policies or practices of the Diocesan Combined Endowment.

85th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester Ecumenical and Interreligious Officer: Official Report

Interfaith and ecumenical activity continues to be very active in Rochester.

I serve as diocesan representative on the Commission on Christian Muslim Relations(CCMR) and also on the Commission on Christian Jewish Relations(CCJR). Both of these commissions meet monthly and prepare a variety of educational and community events serving their various constituencies. The CCMR sponsors a variety of interfaith conversations for the general public. This year the CCMR decided to embark on a program to pair Christian families with Muslim families in order to help break down stereotypes, foster understanding of Islam and build bridges.

Thefamilies who volunteered for this program we reguests of the ICR at their annual Interfaith Iftar in early June.

The CCJR devoted its time during 2015-2016 to continuing the interfaith dialogue that has been on going for many years in that group on a variety of issues and topics of contemporary concern, including the increasing tensions between liberal mainline Protestants and the American Jewish community over issues relating to Israel and Palestine. The CCJR also hosted its 20th year of monthly Jewish Christian Bible study, which draws a dedicated crowd of nearly 80 people each month. I was a presenter at one of those sessions along with Rabbi Kelly Levy of the Jewish Community. I was also appointed to serve as a Partner For Peace with a Jewish rabbi, where we commit to regular conversation and study together on the issues around Israel and Palestine, with the hope of creating safe spaces for civil dialogue on that contentious issue.

I also serve as one of two diocesan representatives on the board of the Greater Rochester Community of Churches Faith in Action Network, which meets monthly. The Rev. Dr. Peter Peters also serves on that board. In March, the diocese, in conjunction with FAIN sponsored the eighth annual ecumenical Good Friday Stations of the Cross walk. That event was extremely successful, with over 200 walkers from seven different denominations, including a significant contingent of young people in attendance and garnering television coverage on all our local TV stations.

I also serve on the Advisory Board and the program committee for the Hickey Center for Interfaith Studies and Dialogue at Nazareth College. In the past year, I have done lectures at several CISD educational programs including the Global Citizenship Conference for high school students in March 2016, attended by over 500 high school students from Rochester and upstate New York. I served on the program committee for that conference. The Hickey Center sponsored a major conference in May on environmental sustainability, with scholars from all over the world offering papers on issues involving the environment with a religious or theological analysis. I served as moderator for one of those panels and am serving on the committee that will select the papers that will be published into a book out of the conference.

In October 2015 I attended the Parliament of the World's Religions in Salt Lake City, Utah. At that conference I was on a panel with Dr. Muhammad Shafiq and Dr. Susan Nowak from Nazareth College and a speaker from Union Theological Seminary discussing the Common Word Document, a statement issued in 2007 by 138 Muslim scholars to the Christian world which has spawned many dialogues and interfaith endeavors ever since. I also advised a team of my college students who presented two workshops of relevance to young people at the Parliament. While at the Parliament I networked with

other Episcopal EDEIO representatives who were there. The Parliament is the premier interfaith gathering in the world, bringing together people from 50 religious communities in 80 countries.

This past year Bishop Singh also convened a group of interfaith leaders in Rochester to discuss how faith communities can contribute to the Anti-Poverty initiative in Rochester and how we can, as an interfaith community, respond to racism, violence and poverty in our city. At a large gathering of interfaith leaders in late summer, Bishop Singh was tasked with calling together a committee of interfaith leaders to discuss reframing and restructuring interfaith work in Rochester. I will be one of the members of that committee going forward as we try to streamline the enormous amount of interfaith work that is done in this city.

In all of these activities, I represent the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester and endeavor to see that we are a serious player in the emerging and vibrant interfaith community in Rochester and in the national and international arena. Interfaith dialogue and education are critical in today's world and I serve in these roles to ensure that this diocese is well represented at all the critical interfaith events that happen in this local community and in ECUSA.

Report:

Episcopal SeniorLife Communities is pleased to partner with many in order to continue our good work – parishes, corporate supporters, donors, volunteers, staff, residents, and family members are the key to our success. Together, we are meeting the needs of seniors in unique and innovative ways as a direct response to consumer expectations, and community engagement remains at the forefront of our efforts. Our vision remains strong as we create relationships and communities that inspire active, purposeful, and fulfilled lives.

Neighborhood Program Expansion

The overall Neighborhood Program goal is to promote wellness through health education, physical activity, socialization and healthy eating as an avenue for seniors to maintain independence and remain active in their communities. Since last year, we have launched our sixth Neighborhood Program in the Honeoye Falls/Mendon area (based out of our Pinehurst campus) to add to our existing Neighborhood Programs in Henrietta, the South Wedge, Northeast Greece, the Westside (Gates, Chili, Ogden, Spencerport) and East Avenue area. Overall data is showing that 95% of members are living healthier lifestyles since being involved in our Neighborhood Programs (i.e. increased fruit/vegetable consumption; increased steps/day; increased health knowledge; etc.).

The ESLC Transportation Service – a volunteer-based initiative – remains an important aspect of our Neighborhood Programs, and provides seniors around our communities an invaluable resource to remain independent. We continually work with Lifespan of Greater Rochester to train volunteers, and are accepting new volunteer drivers.

We have also expanded an intergenerational program – referred to as GAP (Generations Align Project) – which brings seniors and youth together, and is designed to improve the self-esteem and sense of purpose for both generations. We have established numerous community partnerships to support this effort, including: Making a Connection Academy (MAC), part of the Rochester City School District; Rochester City Schools #19 and #20; Greece Central School District; and The City of Rochester Department of Recreation and Youth Services. Through this program, seniors have social opportunities to help maintain independence and youth develop a relationship that encourages learning. Both generations gain knowledge of nutrition and ways to improve their overall health.

Another important aspect of our Neighborhood Programs is community gardens. This was the third year of the gardens at our Northeast Greece location/Neighborhood Program and more than 2,387 lbs. total have been harvested there (700 lbs. in year one; 1,029 lbs. in year two; 685 lbs. to date this year). We have added additional gardens at The Episcopal Church Home and produce is available for residents, family, community members, staff and guests. These gardens were installed with those youth involved in GAP, and under the direction of a master gardener.

Participation numbers for our Neighborhood Programs are growing steadily with 150+ community members throughout Monroe County. In 2015 alone, 1,355 health and wellness classes were offered through this programming. We are pleased to have the support of many community partners, including Church of the Epiphany, who are vital to the success of these programs.

Pastoral Care

The mission of the pastoral care program within ESLC is to provide meaningful and consistent pastoral support to residents, family, staff and neighborhood members of all faiths. The Pastoral Care Department has recently added a full-time Pastoral Assistant, Marino Fernández, who has assimilated quickly into the organization and with the guidance of The Rev. Bryon Roy, ESLC Chaplain, continues to navigate his spiritual journey. With the addition of this position, we are able to increase the frequency of worship services and discussion groups, as well as the personal visits, which mean so much to our residents and families.

In addition, funding from last year's annual golf tournament was designated to support the ESLC Spiritual Care Program through the purchase and installation of video equipment, allowing for remote access/viewing of programs being offered in The Chapel of the Good Shepherd at our satellite campuses. Seniors have greatly benefitted from these enhancements as our reach has increased with the addition.

Staff Growth

ESLC is building and implementing a work force engagement plan, and is committed to the overall health and well- being of all staff. There are many wellness opportunities throughout the year including employee health and wellness fairs, Blue 4U screenings (blood test health screening – participants receive insurance discount), bi- monthly blood pressure screenings, public market days for employees to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables, monthly lunch and learn sessions, and workshops on financial and emotional health. In the spring, ESLC participated again in the JP Morgan Chase Corporate Challenge at RIT. We continue to partner with Strong EAP, offering a free program to employees who are in need of counseling and therapy. In addition, ESLC has partnered with Summit Federal Credit Union (?) to establish a new employee loan program to assist employees in qualifying for financing – the program has proven to be beneficial resource to many staff. Numerous other funds are available to support staff in a variety of ways. All of these initiatives assist us in supporting the importance of good health and wellness of our workforce, which is currently 611 strong.

Gratitude

We are extremely grateful for the overwhelming support shown by those who generously give of their time and resources to ESLC. More than \$115K was raised through our 20th Annual Golf Tournament, and more than 200 golfers took part in the day and even more joined in for dinner. Also, 420 volunteers donated 9,799 hours of volunteer time the past year. Together, we are helping seniors and are truly making a difference! We thank you for your continued support and partnership on the journey of providing the utmost quality of care for seniors in and around our communities.

Our Future

As we look to the future, we reflect on our heritage playing a key role as we move forward. We are committed to carefully preserving the integrity of our long-time quality services and take further steps towards building our most valuable resource – our workforce. The year has been a period of thoughtful planning, and strengthening of those services and partnerships that have been instrumental in all we do . . . all while maintaining our excellence in programs. As we know, seniors desire options, so we will continue to explore growth opportunities for those with varying backgrounds, means, needs and interests. We will remain committed to our social obligation as a faith- based, not-for-profit organization. Also, we will sharpen our focus on health and wellness programming designed to equip seniors with knowledge and opportunity so they can lead healthy, independent lives. All of these efforts will enhance our reputation as being one of the most trusted resources for seniors and their families.

The ability to broaden our vision and mission into new areas would not be possible without the support of those closest to us. Together with many, we are truly making a difference in the lives of seniors now and for years to come.

Report:

The last year has been one of regrouping and discernment. With the Supreme Court decision affirming the validity

same-gender marriages nationwide, much of the energy and urgency we once saw has left the LGBT movement as a whole. While we still march as a diocese in the local Pride Parade, there is more that we want to do.

There are still instances of discrimination, and there are still examples of the suffering, even death of gay and

lesbian youth and especially the vulnerability of the non-conforming youth, be they transgender, effeminate boys or masculine girls. What can the "Church near us" do to love, support and defend our vulnerable children? How can we let them know that they are our own?

Also rising up is the issue of the LGBTQ elderly. The Gay Alliance of the Genesee Valley has hosted a program called "Shoulders to Stand On" which has featured early pioneer Fr. Walter Szymanski among others. The STSO has been

accumulating historical items and gathering data. One thing that is obvious is that the LGBTQ community around us is aging. OASIS will be working to identify ways that "the Church near us" can protect and include the elders of the LGBTQ community and let them, too, know that they are our own.

We ask the entire Diocese to help us in our ministry: encourage the LGBTQ members of your parish to join us; seek out and report to us instances of LGBTQ discrimination/bullying; plan on joining the Diocesan party marching in July of 2017.

Mission Statement: Promote within parishes of the dioceses an understanding of the challenges and opportunities faced by the incarcerated and re-entering men and women and their families, and to encourage and support ministries within our parishes to assist this community.

Report:

The Prison Ministry Advisory Board promotes volunteering and involvement of churches within our diocese in helping prisoners and their families. In addition, where the need arises, we occasionally start or manage new ministries. Our website can be accessed at www.prisonministry-edr.org. We publish an e-newsletter several times each year that can be accessed from our website. Currently, board members / friends of the board are reaching out to over 1000 area prisoners through involvement with many non-profit agencies including: Catholic Family Center, Compeer, Judicial Process Commission, Literacy Volunteers of Rochester, Northeast District Storybook Project, Rochester Storybook Pilot Project, Rochester Interfaith Jail Ministry, Safer Monroe Area Re- entry Taskforce (SMART), Step-by-Step of Rochester, Boy Scout, and Girl Scout Programs. In addition, one of our members (Christ Church, Corning) celebrates the Holy Eucharist and visits with groups of prisoners in the Steuben County Jail.

Highlights Since the Last Convention:

Notable highlights of our board's activities and / or activities of our members and friends who collaborate with us since the last convention, are listed below.

Start up of Rochester Storybook Project at Monroe Correctional Facility:

This is modeled after the very successful Northeast District Storybook Project which serves people housed at the Ontario County Jail. With the Storybook Project, selected prisoners read children's stories into a digital recorder. The recording (in CD format) is sent along with a new book of the same story to the reader's child. The child can then read along with the parent as though the parent were home. St. Peter's is also joined in this project by participants from St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Brockport; Christ Episcopal Church, Rochester; St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Rochester; and St. Luke's and St. Simon Cyrene Episcopal Church, Rochester; Spiritus Christi Church, Rochester; St. Monica's Roman Catholic Church, Rochester; Victor First Presbyterian Church, Victor; and Webster Christian Reformed Church, Webster.

Our project began its "Pilot" phase (small scale operation recording just female participants to demonstrate operational feasibility and work out any "bugs" in the system) prior to obtaining approval for full scale operation utilizing male and female participants, this last February, 2016. As of this writing, we have obtained approval to begin full scale operation with both men and women beginning this October 2016. The "Pilot" phase as well as the beginning of the full production operation has been funded by a grant from the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester.

To date, our project has been well received by our recording participants who are grateful for the opportunity to use these recordings to stay connected with their children during the separation from their families. We have also heard from guardians that the children love hearing their parent's voice reading them stories and at the same time receiving their very own story book.

StaffattheMonroeCorrectionalFacility(MCF),havebeenhighlyenthusiastic and supportive of our project. Ourvolunteersforthisprojectgreatlyappreciatethesupporttheyhavebeengiven by the MCF staff, and have found the "Pilot" phase very helpful in producing a well-organized and efficient operation.

Our Coordinator and Directory, Britt Hopkin, has received much help and advice from the Northeast District Storybook Project, including its director, Claire Kremer (also a member of our Prison Ministry Advisory Board), and visited a recording session they were conducting with female participants in the Ontario County Correctional Facility in Hopewell NY this June. The help and support we have received from the Ontario project has been critical to our operation, and is deeply appreciated.

Northeast District Storybook Project at Ontario County Correctional Facility

The Northeast District Storybook Project continues in very high production as it is concluding its 11th year of operation. The new documentary film about Claire's project, "Turn the Page" was screened at the Little Theater in Rochester this last February, and is now in nearly completed form. As part of the publicity leading to the screening, Claire was interviewed on the Evan Dawson program aired by WXXI in Rochester, and also on the "Need to Know" TV program also produced by WXXI. In addition, the Canandaigua Times interviewed Claire about her project, and then won a national award based on the article. The production of the film, and Claire's broadcast appearances have been tremendously helpful to helping the Rochester Storybook Project obtain volunteers and other support.

Prison Re-entry and Aftercare Ministries (PRAM) / Youth Intervention and Aftercare Ministries (YIAM) – St. Thomas, Rochester

This June, the Prison Ministry Program at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Rochester, held a series of three lectures given by members of the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Psychiatry regarding needs and services for prisoners before, and during re-entry back into their community. The first lecture was presented by Dr. Catherine Cerulli and entitled "Pipeline to Prison", which details the many ways people can get caught up in the criminal justice system. The second lecture was given by Dr. Diane Morse, MD, and dealt with the special needs that women have as they return back to their communities from incarceration. A program specially set up for women was featured, entitled Women's Initiative Serving Health (WISH). The third and final lecture was given by Dr. Steven Lamberti, which detailed the psychiatric needs of prisoners during incarceration and in aftercare. Summaries of the first two lectures can be obtained by visiting the Prison Ministry Advisory Board's website www.prisonministry-edr.org and click on "Newsletters". This is an archive of all of our e-newsletters.

PRAM St. Thomas, continues to provide programs which focus on relationship building, and responds to letters sent in by inmates.

PRAMalsoworkswithvolunteersfromotherserviceproviderssuchasVolunteersofAmerica / Step-by-Step of Rochester, as well as the University of Rochester Medical Center.

YIAM St. Thomas provides Scouts Beyond Bars programming which works closely with both Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. These programs are aimed at children who have a parent who is (or has been) incarcerated. This work aligns with established scout units and utilizes trauma-informed care for the children to help them create stability and structure in their lives.

YIAM St. Thomas is also working with 16 & 17 year-old youth incarcerated in the Downtown Jail in Rochester, and is aimed at supporting a more successful reentry process for youth offenders. Much of the programing for YIAM is based on a modified version of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT).

Prison Re-entry and Aftercare Ministries – Ascension Church

PRAM—Ascension through the work of Bob Crystal is leading Rochester Interfaith Jail Ministry and is operating group programs for adults in the Monroe Correctional Facility (MCF) based on the "Houses of Healing" series published by Lion Heart Press in 8 week cycles, and is leading a similar series also from Lion Heart Press, "Power

Source" in the Monroe County Jail (MCF) in Downtown Rochester for incarcerated youth charged with adult crimes.

Ascension Episcopal Church hosts the Cephas support group for Rochester every Tuesday evening for released people and their families. They have been doing this since 2006. Ascension also hosts classes for CASAC and Social Work licenses, and also maintains regular correspondence with inmates in various state and federal facilities. PRAM Ascension is looking to begin a ministry of transportation of family members from downtown Rochester to the three nearby facilities: Livingston / Groveland, Attica / Wyoming, and Albion / Orleans facilities. They need a bus, a driver and funds for insurance and gas as well.

Belmont and Corning: Gloria Lundberg is continuing the Step-by-Step programs in the Allegheny County Jail in Belmont, and Jan Farnsworth of Christ Church, Corning is continuing to celebrate Holy Eucharist in the Steuben County Jail in Corning.

The Public Policy Committee presented its annual Workshop & Luncheon on April 9, 2016 at St. Mark's & St. John's. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the topic and presenters had to be suddenly changed. We then received incredible support from Bishop Singh, Matthew Townsend, and Kristy Estey in identifying three new speakers for a revised version of the main topic of poverty. Instead of entering into a Poverty Simulation, we were quickly able to enter into discussions concerning poverty and where it intersects with race. A total of thirty-seven people, including Priests, laity, a probationer, and diocesan Staff attended the Workshop. Three speakers each took time for questions. Our first speaker was Mitch Gruber, Director of Programs & Innovations at Food Link. Our second speaker was Edward Doherty, author of the 2013 Poverty Report. Our afternoon facilitator was Bishop Singh. He asked theologically based questions dealing with personal transformation that leads to seeing the face of God in others.

We continue to focus on discerning new ways to interact with Priests and laity in our 8-county Diocese, on preparing an informative web-site, and seeking new ways to journey with and be supportive of others in advocating for justice. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Diocesan Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester (the "Diocese"), which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2015, and the related statements of activities and change in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

The Diocese has not adopted the accounting or disclosure requirements for donor restricted gifts including endowments. In our opinion, all donor restricted gifts should be accounted for as temporarily or permanently restricted to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The effects of this departure from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America on the accompanying financial statements could not be determined.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects on the matters discussed in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Episcopal Diocese of Rochester as of December 31, 2015, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matter

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The other financial information (page 22), for the year ended December 31, 2015, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, except for the effects on the other financial information as explained in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph of this report, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The information marked "unaudited" has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

The financial statements of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester for the year ended December 31, 2014, were audited by another auditor whose report dated August 18, 2015 expressed a qualified opinion on those statements, for the matters described above. The 2014 summarized comparative information presented herein is derived from those audited financial statements.

NOTE A: THE DIOCESE AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Diocese

The Episcopal Diocese of Rochester (the "Diocese") was formed in December 1931. It stretches from Lake Ontario south to Pennsylvania, its east and west borders are formed by the Diocese of Central New York and the Diocese of Western New York. The Diocese comprises Episcopal congregations throughout eight counties in the State of New York. These are Steuben, Allegany, Schuyler, Yates, Livingston, Ontario, Wayne and Monroe Counties. It includes 46 active congregations and several summer and institutional chapels. The Diocesan House, located on East Avenue in Rochester, New York is the administrative center of the Diocese and houses the office of the Bishop.

The vision and mission of the Diocese are described as follows:

- Vision "Joy in Christ, as a way of life"
- Mission "Grow and develop congregations spiritually, numerically and in missional leadership"

The Diocese is rich in material and spiritual resources and in people able and willing to use them.

Basis of accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"), except for the items noted below:

The Diocese has not adopted financial reporting practices to reflect the classification of its net assets and activities as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted in conformity with GAAP. Rather, it uses the principles of fund accounting consistent with its historical practice. In addition, the financial statements do not include a disclosure providing the composition of, and activity related to endowment funds, as well as the related spending policy, investment return objectives and other information related to managing the endowment which are required by GAAP. The effects of these departures from GAAP in the accompanying financial statements could not be determined.

Financial statement presentation

The assets, liabilities, and net assets of the Diocese are classified as follows:

<u>Unrestricted</u>: Represents net assets available for use without any donor-imposed restrictions. The following unrestricted funds are maintained by the Diocese:

<u>Operating</u>: This fund is used to account for all resources which are intended for current operating activities. In addition, a significant portion of the income from investments held in other funds is transferred to the operating fund to support operations.

Special Purpose: This fund includes the General Endowment investments and Housing Loan Fund.

Real Estate: This fund includes the Diocese's net investment in land, buildings and equipment.

<u>Restricted</u>: Represents net assets that have donor-imposed restrictions that require the Diocese to treat the donated asset as specified. The following restricted funds are maintained by the Diocese:

<u>Endowment</u>: This fund consists of permanent endowments contributed to the Diocese, the earnings from which are available to support operating activities.

<u>By Donors</u>: This fund consists of amounts that are restricted by the donor for a specified purpose, as well as amounts belonging to parishes in the Diocese deposited with the Diocese for investment management purposes

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash balances are maintained at various financial institutions located in Upstate New York and are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000 at each institution. In the normal course of business, the cash account balances at any given time may exceed insured limits. However, the Diocese has not experienced any losses in such accounts and does not believe it is exposed to significant risk in cash.

Mortgages and loans receivable

Mortgages and loans receivable represent amounts due to the Diocese under loan agreements with parishes. Loans are stated at unpaid principal balances, less an allowance for loan losses. The Diocese periodically evaluates the loan for collectability based on inherent collection risks and adverse situations that may affect the borrower's ability to repay. Loans for which no contractual payments have been received for a period of time are considered delinquent. After all collection efforts are exhausted, any amounts deemed uncollectible based upon an assessment of the debtor's financial condition are written off. The Diocese believes that no allowance for loan loss is necessary at December 31, 2015 and 2014.

Loans are placed on nonaccrual status when management believes collection of interest is doubtful. As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, the Diocese did not have any loans on nonaccrual status.

Investments

Investments are stated at fair value. The fair value of all debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are based on quotations obtained from national security agencies. The alternative investments, which are not readily marketable, are carried at estimated fair values as provided by the investment managers. The Diocese reviews and evaluates the values provided by the investment managers and agrees with the valuation methods and assumptions used in determining the fair value of the alternative investments. Those estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a market for these securities existed. The Diocese's investment in Community Development mortgages and loans receivable are carried at historical cost. Due to the risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair value of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements.

Land, buildings and equipment

Land, buildings and equipment of the Diocese are stated at cost. However, missions (parish churches, which are not self-supporting) and other properties which were reverted back to the Diocese are recorded at the appraised value or estimated fair value at the time the Diocese obtained possession of the property. The Diocese's policy is to capitalize property and equipment in excess of \$1,000 which have a useful life of greater than three years. Beginning in 2012, depreciation expense is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, which are as follows:

Buildings and building improvements 40 Years Equipment 3-10 Years

Tax exempt status

The Diocese is a not-for-profit corporation and is exempt from income taxes as a religious organization. The Diocese has also been classified by the Internal Revenue Service as an entity that is not a private foundation.

Revenue

The Diocese recognizes revenue when it is realized or realizable and has been earned. Investment gain (loss) includes interest and dividends earned during the period as well as realized and unrealized gains and losses on investment, net of investment expense.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from these estimates.

Comparative totals as of December 31, 2014

The accompanying financial statements include certain prior year summarized comparative information in total, but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with The Diocese's financial statements that the year ended December 31, 2014, from which the summarized information was derived.

Subsequent events

The Diocese has conducted an evaluation of potential subsequent events occurring after the statement of financial position date through August 2, 2016, which is the date the financial statements are available to be issued. No subsequent events requiring disclosure were noted.

Mortgages and loans receivable bear interest at rates ranging from 2.5% to 3.75% and mature at various dates through August 2032. Approximately \$297,000 and \$319,000 of the balance of the receivables outstanding at December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively, are secured by first and second mortgages. All remaining amounts outstanding are unsecured.

Interest on mortgages and loans is recognized over the term of the mortgage or loan and is calculated using the simple-interest method on principal amounts outstanding.

Other investments are carried at cost and represent the Diocese's investment in community development initiatives in the form of interest-bearing loans that have been approved by the Diocesan Trustees. The Diocese is authorized by the Trustees to loan up to 10% of its unrestricted endowment fund in fixed rate loans for community development purposes. These loans are considered investments for purposes of the Diocese's investment spending policy and bear interest at 2.5%.

Prior to January 2014, the Diocese served as the intermediary custodian of funds held for the benefit of certain congregations and other organizations. As intermediary custodian, the Diocese served as a fiscal intermediary for the parishes to administratively transact their funds. These funds are invested with Genesee Valley Trust (GVT), the custodian of the Diocesan Combined Endowment, with investment income allocated to the benefit of each congregation or organization. Prior to January 2014, the Diocesan balance sheet included the entire asset value of the GVT Combined Endowment. Effective January 2014, GVT moved to direct administration of investment deposits, withdrawals and other transactions with the congregations in the Diocesan Combined Endowment, and as such, the Diocese did not serve as intermediary custodian of the funds subsequent to this change. The Diocese removed the investments of these parishes and congregations, and the related Funds Held for Others liability, from their financial statements. In 2014, and there was no effect on net assets. However, these funds continue to be invested together at GVT. The following investment and fair value disclosures pertain to the total fund at GVT.

The Trustees of the Diocese intend to reduce the spending rate over the next 5 years to approximately 5% of the trailing, 5-year average of the audited, year-end, market value of endowment assets. The market value of these assets is inclusive of the Cutler Trusts, as well as the year-end balance of the Diocesan loan and mortgage assets.

NOTE D: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows:

- Level 1 Financial assets valued using level 1 inputs are based on unadjusted quoted market prices within active markets. Investments included in level 1 may include equity securities, mutual funds, and exchange traded funds.
- Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:
 - Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
 - Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
 - Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
 - Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology that are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2015 and 2014:

Money market funds, U.S government obligations, fixed income mutual funds, equity mutual funds, common stock and real estate investment trusts (REITS): Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual funds are traded.

Corporate bonds: Valued by third party brokers based on terms and conditions using trades, bid price or spread, two sided markets, quotes, benchmark curves, discount rates, financial statements and trustee reports.

Common trust funds (Level two): Valued at net asset value provided by the underlying fund managers. The following is a description of the fund:

Silchester International Investors International Value Equity Trust - The Trust is a Delaware Statutory Trust investing in a diversified portfolio of equity securities of companies ordinarily incorporated in any country other than the United States for an opportunity to obtain long-term capital gains and income. Redemptions are permitted on a monthly basis as of the first business day of each month. As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, the Diocese had no unfunded commitments related to this investment.

Alternative institutional fund (Level two): Valued at the Diocese's share of the net asset value of funds the Diocese is invested in. Management has determined to use the net asset value as a practical expedient to determining fair value. The following is a description of the alternative institutional fund:

<u>Pine Grove Alternative Institutional Fund</u> – The Fund is a Delaware statutory trust registered as a non-diversified, closed end management investment company offering shares of beneficial interest at net asset value per share. The investment objective of the Fund is to seek long-term capital appreciation. Redemptions are permitted on a monthly basis based on a restriction period of up to ten months. As of December 31, 2015, the Diocese had no unfunded commitments related to this investment.

Alternative investments (Level three): Valued at fair value utilizing valuations provided by the underlying fund managers. The market value of the underlying investments in the funds are valued based on unobservable inputs. The following is a description of the alternative investment:

Broadstone Net Lease, LLC – The Company is a real estate investment trust focused on investing in income-producing, net leased commercial properties. The Company owns commercial properties in the United States and leases the properties to businesses under the terms of long-term lease arrangements. As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, the Diocese had no unfunded commitments to this LLC. The Diocese can redeem shares quarterly; however, the investment is subject to redemption restrictions. If the investment has been held for more than 5 years, then the investor can redeem shares at 100% of the determined share value. If the investment has been held for less than 5 years, but greater than 1 year, there is a 5% penalty, (i.e. the investor receives 95% of the determined share value). Investments held for less than 1 year cannot be redeemed (i.e. 1 year lock up). The max redemption per quarter is 1% of shares outstanding at the start of the year PLUS 50% of reinvested dividends in the previous quarter. Broadstone can decide to redeem up to 5% of shareholder's allocation at any time within each calendar year.

Additionally, investors are prohibited from submitting a request to redeem the result of which if honored, would leave a remaining investment by the shareholder of less than (a) 500 shares if the initial investment was made prior to October 1, 2009; or (b) 5,000 shares if the initial investment by the shareholder was made from October 1, 2009 to January 31, 2011; or (c) \$250,000 of shares (pursuant to the Determined Share Value in effect at the time of the transfer) if the initial investment was made after January 31, 2011.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE F: RETIREMENT AND BENEFIT PLANS

Retirement Plans

Diocesan clergy participate in the Church Pension Fund of the National Episcopal Church. Under the terms of this plan, the Diocese contributes 18% of each employee's salary to the plan. Employer contributions were approximately \$47,607 and \$48,707 for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively.

The Diocese sponsors a defined contribution plan for full-time lay employees. Under the terms of this plan, the Diocese contributes up to 12% of each employee's salary to the plan. In addition, employees are allowed to make elective tax-deferred contributions. Employer contributions were approximately \$45,571 and \$57,620 for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively.

Postretirement Health Insurance Benefits

On an annual basis the Diocese determines what amount, if any, it will make available to pay health insurance benefits on behalf of its retired clergy, partners and Diocesan staff. The Diocese records an expense for these plans as insurance premiums are paid. Expense related to these plans totaled \$95,372 and \$93,290 for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively.

for the Government of

THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER

in the State of New York

As Revised and Adopted in the Convention of 2016

Including the Rules of Order

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Canon 2

PREAMBLE

We thank God for our part in the noble past of the Diocese of Western New York from which we have been informed and in which we have had our place, and, prior to its formation in A.D. 1838, our participation in the Diocese of New York; for our spiritual descent from the Mother Church of England before the independence of these United States of America and for our origin and part in the One, Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church of Jesus Christ to which we yield our allegiance.

ARTICLE I Authority of the General Church

The Church in the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester comprises the Counties of Allegany, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Schuyler, Steuben, Wayne and Yates, in the state of New York; and, as a constituent part of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, accedes to the Constitution and Canons of that Church, and acknowledges its authority accordingly.

ARTICLE II Annual and Special Convention

Section 1.

There shall be a Convention of the Church in this Diocese called annually no later than November 30 at such time and place as shall be determined by the Bishop with the approval of the Standing Committee.

Section 2.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to call Special Conventions; provided the notice of such meeting shall state the purpose for which it is called, and is sent to all clergy entitled to vote and all parishes and missions entitled to representation in such Convention at least 30 days before the appointed time thereof. No business other than that stated in the notice shall be transacted, except by a two-thirds vote of all clergy equal to the number of parochial clergy, and by the two-thirds vote of lay delegates who in aggregate equal the number of delegates from two-thirds of all parishes and missions entitled to representation.

ARTICLE III

Members of the Convention

The Convention shall consist of clergy and laity; and shall be the judge of the election, eligibility and qualification of its members.

Section 1. The Clerical Members

The Clerical Members of the Diocese shall include:

- (a) The Bishop or Bishops of the Diocese:
- (b) All the other clergy of the Diocese duly admitted by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof, who have been at least six weeks in regular standing in accordance with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese and of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America;
- (c) Ordained Episcopal clergy functioning in charge of congregations by license with this Diocese, provided that any of the foregoing have been in office at least six weeks;
- (d) And ordained, non-Episcopal clergy who are in good standing with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the denomination under whose discipline they minister and who are serving as minister-in-charge or co-minister-in-charge of an ecumenical parish or mission in union with the Church in this Diocese as represented in Convention, except that neither Episcopal clergy functioning by license nor ecumenical clergy shall be eligible to vote on a question to amend the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese or in any election of a Bishop.

Section 2. The Lay Members

- (a) Each parish and organized mission received into union with the Convention shall be entitled to not more than three delegates, or alternates, who have been duly chosen by the vestry or congregation of such parish or by the executive committee or congregation of such mission, and who shall be baptized persons qualified to vote for the members of the Vestry or officers of such parish or mission.
- (b) No lay delegate, or other representative, shall be qualified for a seat in the Convention (except a Convention for the election of a Bishop) until the parish's or mission's apportionment for the Diocese and National Church shall have been fully paid, nor until the report of the parish or mission required by the Canons of the Diocese and General Convention shall have been made, nor until the Pension Fund premiums for the previous calendar year shall have been fully paid; except in special cases recommended by the Diocesan Council or its authorized agent, as provided by Canon, and approved by the Convention.
- (c) The Chancellor, Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocese, ex officio, or their assistants, if the principals are not able to serve, and Lay Canons, if they are not otherwise members of Convention, shall have seat, voice and vote in the Convention, except in the case of a vote by Orders. Other Diocesan Staff, members of elected or appointed diocesan bodies shall have seat and voice subject to the direction of the Ordinary. Official guests of the Convention invited by the Ecclesiastical Authority shall have the courtesy of the floor, and at the Authority's invitation may address the Convention.
- (d) No lay delegate, or other representative, of any parish or mission, shall be qualified for a seat in a Convention for the Election of a Bishop unless such person shall be canonically resident in this Diocese.

ARTICLE IV

President of the Convention

The Bishop of the Diocese, or in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor or the Suffragan Bishop, if there be such and in that order, shall preside in the Convention; but in case of absence or vacancy in the Episcopate, the President of the Standing Committee shall call the Convention to order and the members shall thereupon elect a President from among the clergy.

ARTICLE V

Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor, Registrar

Section 1.

A Secretary and a Treasurer shall be nominated by the Bishop and Standing Committee and shall be confirmed by the Convention and shall hold office for a term of five years. Should there be a vacancy in either office, the Bishop in consultation with the Standing Committee shall appoint a proper officer to complete the unexpired term.

Section 2.

On the nomination of the Bishop, a Chancellor of the Diocese who is skilled in ecclesiastical and civil law, shall be elected by the Convention for a term of three years. In the event of a vacancy due to removal from office or other cause, the Bishop, in consultation with the Standing Committee, may appoint a successor who shall serve until the next Convention.

Section 3.

The Bishop shall appoint the Registrar and notify the Convention thereof.

Section 4.

The Secretary, Treasurer, Chancellor or Registrar may be removed from office at any time by the Bishop in consultation with the Standing Committee.

ARTICLE VI Voting in Convention

Section 1.

The clergy and laity shall deliberate as one body. Each member shall be entitled to one vote; and a majority of all the votes cast shall determine the question unless otherwise provided.

Section 2.

If a separate vote by orders is required by Canon or by the request of five members, the clergy and laity shall vote as individuals, and a majority of the votes in each order shall be necessary to carry any measure.

ARTICLE VII

The Standing Committee

Section 1.

There shall be a Standing Committee of the Diocese, consisting of four presbyters or deacons and four lay persons, communicants of the Church in the Diocese. One member of the clergy and one member of the laity shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Convention to serve four years and no member shall be eligible for re-election until at least one year shall have elapsed after serving one full term. One member of the clergy and one member of the laity shall be elected at each annual Convention for a four year term as aforementioned. The Committee may meet from time to time in conformity to its own rules, shall elect a President and Secretary from its membership, shall perform such duties as may be assigned to it by the Diocesan Convention, and shall perform all duties and exercise all powers directed to it by the Canons of General Convention. Vacancies in the Committee shall be filled until the next Convention by the concurrent vote of the remaining clerical and lay members, and the consent of the Bishop. A quorum of the Standing Committee shall consist of five elected members provided that at least two members in each Order are present.

Section 2.

As provided by the Constitution (Article IV) and Canons, (Title I, Canon 12, Section 1) of the General Convention, the Standing Committee shall act as the Bishop's Council of Advice. It shall be summoned on the requisition of the Bishop whenever the Bishop shall desire its advice; and it may meet of its own accord and agreeable to its own rules when it may be disposed to advise the Bishop.

Section 3.

In the absence of the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes declared by the General Convention."

Section 4.

No member of the clergy or lay person shall hold office concurrently as a member of the Standing Committee, excepting any ex officio members, and also as a member or member-at-large of the Diocesan Council, a Trustee of the Diocese and/or as a member of the Commission on Ministry.

ARTICLE VIII Election of a Bishop

Section 1.

- (a) A Nominating Committee shall be established by the Ecclesiastical Authority with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee and a slate of nominees shall be developed. The Standing Committee may also establish other procedures for securing nominees. The list of nominees shall include candidates who have been selected with due consideration of the Diocesan Profile (if there be one,) and of the guidelines of the National Church.
- (b) The Electing Convention shall convene under the Rules of Order for an Electing Convention (if such exist, otherwise under the standing Rules of Order for a Convention.) Such Rules of Order shall be presented to the Electing Convention for its ratification or amendment, which shall be by majority vote. However, after the first vote is taken, all amendments of the Rules shall be by two-thirds (2/3) majority.

Section 2.

After the Convention has been opened with the Celebration of the Holy Communion and is in order for business, the President shall call for nominations of fit and qualified persons. After the nominations procured by the Standing Committee have been presented, individual nominations are in order, each of which shall require at least two seconds. Individual nominating and seconding speeches may be limited as to time, as provided by the electing Convention.

Section 3.

During the election all persons, save canonical voters and officers of the Convention, shall be required to leave the floor. The Clerical and Lay Orders shall then ballot separately for a Bishop as provided by Article VI, § 2 of this Constitution. A concurrent majority of both orders shall be necessary for the election. However, if less than two-thirds (2/3) of all the parishes be represented, then a two-thirds (2/3) majority in the lay order shall be required for the election. And, if there are fewer clergy present and voting than the whole number of parochial clergy then a two-thirds (2/3) majority shall be required in the clerical order for an election. The election when completed shall be duly declared.

ARTICLE IX

Amendment of Constitution

Any proposal to alter or amend this Constitution shall first be submitted to the Secretary of the Diocese and by the Secretary submitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons at least sixty (60) days before the annual meeting of the Convention of the Diocese, and after consideration and recommendation by that Committee shall be delivered into the hands of the Secretary of the Diocese at least one month before the opening of the Convention and the Secretary shall then circulate the same among the parishes, unless by a two-thirds vote of each Order the Convention shall consent to suspend the time requirement; and if approved by a majority of each Order it shall be acted upon at the next annual Convention; and if the Convention shall then adopt said amendment by a majority of each Order it shall become valid and effective forthwith, unless the Bishop should disapprove of such amendment, and within 24 hours communicate his reasons to the Convention. Should the Convention, however, by its early adjournment prevent the communication of the Bishop's objections, he may present the same on the opening day of the next annual Convention, the amendment in the meantime being ineffective. And should the Convention, at either time after receiving and considering the Bishop's objections, adopt said amendment by a two-thirds vote of each Order, it shall become a valid part of the Constitution.

THE CANONS

CANON 1

The Diocesan Convention

Section 1.

- (a) Some time, not less than one week before the meeting of the Diocesan Convention, the Bishop shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a list of the canonically resident clergy entitled to seats in the Convention. None other than clergy free from all canonical censure shall be recorded in such list. Such list, authenticated by the Bishop, shall be laid before the Diocesan Convention on the first day of its session, for correction of any errors or omissions.
- (b) The right of any member of the clergy to a seat in the Diocesan Convention shall be determined by the Convention, according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons. The Bishop's list shall be presumptive evidence of the right of those whose names are there registered to seats.
- (c) In case the right of any member of the clergy holding or appointed to a parish or cure in this Diocese is contested, the evidence of the member's having a cure of souls shall be the record required by Canon 22, or in the production of the canonical certificate; which certificate, if not previously recorded, shall thereupon be placed on record.
- (d) In case the right of any member of the clergy claiming a seat is contested, the evidence of such right shall be the written certificate of the Ecclesiastical Authority.
- (e) And in case the right of any member of the clergy who may claim a seat by virtue of the member's having been received into this Diocese is contested, the production of the record, or of the certificate of acceptance, as hereinafter provided for, shall be presumptive evidence of a canonical admission; which certificate, if not previously recorded, may thereupon be placed on record by the Secretary, on vote of the Convention.
- (f) A member of the clergy who has been admitted to this Diocese according to its Constitution is qualified for the purposes mentioned in these Canons.

Section 2.

- (a) The evidence of the appointment of a lay delegate shall be a written certificate signed by the Rector, Vicar or Priest in charge of the church, if there be one, or, in case of vacancy, or disability of the clergy, by the Warden who presided at the meeting at which such delegate was appointed, or by the Clerk of the Vestry; which certificate shall be sent to the Secretary at least one week before the meeting of the Convention.
- (b) The right of any member of the laity, duly qualified as above, to a seat in the Convention of the Diocese, in cases of doubt or dispute, shall be determined by the Convention.

Section 3.

Unless it be otherwise ordered by the Convention, the notice of a meeting shall be by a printed or written notice, designating the time and place of such meeting, mailed by the Secretary to each member of the clergy having the right to a seat, and to a Warden or Clerk of the Vestry of each parish in union with the Diocese.

Section 4.

The attendance of at least one-third of the clerical members entitled to vote in the Diocesan Convention, and of delegates from at least one-third of the parishes and missions, entitled to representation, shall be requisite for the transaction of business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, or to some other day within three calendar months.

Section 5.

- (a) It shall be the duty of each clerical delegate attending the Convention to report to the Secretary of the Convention immediately upon arrival. The Secretary shall announce the number of clergy enrolled on the canonical list and entitled to seats who have reported themselves present.
- (b) It shall be the duty of each lay delegate attending the Convention to report to the Secretary of the Convention immediately upon arrival. The Secretary shall announce the number of churches entitled to representation, whose delegates have reported themselves present, and whose certificates have been received and are in due form. Irregular and defective certificates, and certificates and documents referring to contested seats, shall be immediately reported to the Committee on Credentials appointed by the presiding officer.
- (c) A canonical quorum being present, the Bishop or the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention duly organized.
- (d) The Convention shall then proceed to the election of a Secretary. The Secretary may at any time nominate an Assistant Secretary for the action of the Convention.
- (e) The Rules of Order in force at the preceding annual Convention shall be in force for the organization of the Convention and shall remain in force until changed by action of the Convention. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a Convention assembled to elect a bishop shall convene under the "Rules of Order for a Convention to Elect a Bishop," if such exist.
- (f) Any member who is obliged to leave the Convention before its final adjournment, will notify the Secretary when possible.

Section 6.

The regular attendance of the clergy and laity at the meetings of the Convention being of essential consequence to the interests of the Church, this duty is hereby enjoined upon them; and it shall be the duty of every parish to make provision for the expenses of its clergy in attending the Convention.

Section 7.

The *Journal* of the proceedings and acts of the annual Convention shall be published in suitable form. Likewise, a *Journal* of any special Convention shall be published bound together with the *Journal* of the annual Convention immediately preceding or following, or separately, as may be most convenient.

Section 8.

The Diocesan Convention shall annually establish salary scales and additional material provisions or expense allowances to be received by all clergy in the employ of the Diocese, its parishes, missions, or programs.

CANON 2 Duties of Officers

Section 1. The Secretary:

In addition to other duties imposed by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, the Secretary shall perform the following duties:

- (a) The Secretary shall record and attest the proceedings and acts of the Convention; preserve the *Journals* and other records of the Diocese and deliver them to the Registrar for safe keeping; and also perform such other duties as the Convention shall prescribe.
 - (1) The *Journal* shall display lists of the names of each person elected or appointed to a term of office, together with the year in which the term expires.
- (2) Beside each name there shall be a notation as to whether the current term is a full term or a

partial term and whether the person is eligible for reelection or reappointment.

- (b) The Secretary shall give at least sixty days' notice to every member of the clergy of the Diocese, and to every Vestry therein, of the time and place appointed for the meeting of the annual Convention of the Diocese.
- (c) The Secretary shall hold and preserve all books and papers belonging to the office of Secretary and duly transfer the same to a successor when elected.
- (d) The Secretary shall sign and transmit annually to each of the Diocesan Bishops of this Church, and to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, and to the Secretary of every Diocesan Convention or Council, (except in those cases in which a wish has been expressed not to receive it), a copy of the Journal of the Convention, and shall secure, so far as possible, from the Secretaries of the Diocesan Conventions or Councils, copies of their Journals in exchange.
- (e) The Secretary shall also sign and transmit to every General Convention, for the Secretary of the House of Deputies thereof, in addition to other documents canonically required, a signed certificate, containing a list of the Members of the clergy of this Diocese; and, also, a like certificate of the due election or appointment of clerical and lay deputies.

(f) The Secretary shall, with such aid as may be required, prepare, immediately after the adjournment of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the regular meeting of every General Convention, and forward forthwith to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, upon the blanks provided by the General Convention for that purpose, a condensed summary of the statistics contained in the Parochial Reports and Bishop's statements, with information as to all institutions in any way connected with the Church within the Diocese; and also as to the condition of all invested funds and the amount of all contributions received or expended by the Bishop or otherwise, within the Diocese.

Section 2. The Treasurer

- (a) It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse monies collected under the authority of the Convention, and other contributions for Church objects, except as may be otherwise provided by the Convention or the Diocesan Council. The Treasurer shall report annually to the Convention the amounts so received and disbursed in accordance with this Canon, and shall render to each annual Convention an exhibit of all such accounts, which shall be duly audited.
- (b) An Assistant Treasurer may be chosen by the Diocesan Council and may be removed from office by said Council in consultation with the Bishop.
- (1) It shall be the duty of the Assistant Treasurer to perform the duties of the Treasurer in the Treasurer's absence.
- (c) Each Treasurer shall give a Surety Company Bond, in an amount determined by the Diocesan Council, conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of this office. The form of each bond and the manner of its execution shall be such as shall be approved by the Chancellor of the Diocese; and when so approved, the bond shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Convention. The cost of providing said bonds shall be a charge upon the Diocese.

Section 3. The Chancellor

- (a) The Chancellor shall at all times afford to the Bishop, Standing Committee, and Diocesan Council at their request, confidential or public advice on legal or canonical matters; and shall, on request, give similar advice to the Diocesan Convention.
- (b) It shall also be the Chancellor's duty to review any proposed amendments to the laws of the State which affect the Religious Corporations Law or the property interests of the Church, and to cooperate with the representatives of other Dioceses in the State in securing the passage or defeat of such proposed amendments after reference to the Convention whenever possible.
- (c) At the consecration of any Bishop to serve within this Diocese, the Chancellor shall be present, either in person or by deputy, and shall make a record of such consecration, which record the Chancellor shall authenticate by hand and seal with the subscription of witnesses, and place the same on file among the Archives of the Diocese.

(d) Assistant Chancellors may be appointed by the Bishop to serve at the Bishop's pleasure under the Bishop and the Chancellor and to perform such duties as shall be assigned to them by the Chancellor.

Section 4. The Registrar

- (a) Journals, files, papers, reports and other documents which, under the Canons or otherwise, may become the property of this Convention, shall be committed to the keeping of the Registrar of the Diocese.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the Registrar to procure all such journals, files, papers, reports, copies of charters and acts of incorporation of churches, and other documents as may be of value in the history of the Diocese, to arrange, label, file, index and otherwise put in order, and provide for the safekeeping of the same, and all such others as may hereafter come into the Registrar's possession, in some fireproof, safe and accessible place of deposit, and to hold the same under such regulations and restrictions as the Convention may from time to time provide.
- (c) It shall be the Registrar's duty also to preserve, in a proper Registry Book, a record of the consecration of the successive Bishops of this Diocese, designating accurately the time and place of the same, with the names of the chief Consecrator, and of the Bishops canonically present and assisting; to record a list of all the presbyters and deacons of the Diocese, and the dates of their connection therewith, and copies of the charters and acts of incorporation of churches in the same, with such additional records as may be worthy of safekeeping in the archives of the Diocese.
- (d) It shall be the duty of every member of the clergy who shall be transferred to this Diocese by Letter Dimissory, or who shall remove into this Diocese with the intent to be so transferred, to forthwith transmit to the Registrar a written statement signed by the member, setting forth the date and place of said member's birth; when, where and by whom the member was ordained; the times and places of the member's previous pastoral and missionary labor; with such other details of the said member's personal and official record as the member may think proper, and it shall be the duty of the Registrar to report to the Bishop the name or names of any clergy failing to comply with this provision.

CANON 3 Convention Elections

Section 1.

- (a) In elections the voting shall be by ballot as required by the Canons; provided, that balloting may be dispensed with by a unanimous vote of the Convention, except as hereinafter provided.
- (b) When voting is by ballot, a majority of the ballots cast (excluding blank ballots) shall be necessary to a valid election, unless otherwise provided by Constitution or Canon. If in any

election a greater number of persons than the number of offices to be filled shall receive a canonical majority of ballots cast, those who up to the number of offices to be filled receive the highest majorities shall be declared elected. In the event there is only one candidate for an office, the Convention may direct the Secretary to cast one vote for that candidate.

- (c) In any election the candidate or candidates (to the required number) receiving the highest number of votes on the third ballot (if such is needed) shall be declared elected; however, elections for a Bishop shall require be as the Constitution directs.
- (d) If two or more candidates receive the number of votes necessary to be elected and are tied, and the order of their election must be determined, then there shall be a runoff election among such candidates solely for determining the order of their election, which shall be deemed the election. In no event shall this procedure operate to elect more persons than there are offices to be filled.

Section 2.

In all cases of failure or omission to elect officers by the Convention, the persons last elected, if still resident within the Diocese, shall continue in office until others are duly chosen in their stead, and vacancies may be filled for the time by the Bishop with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee.

Section 3.

- (a) The Bishop, with the approval of the Diocesan Council, shall appoint a Nominating Committee and its chair for the Diocesan Convention composed of two clergy and five lay persons. With the consent of the Bishop, the chair of the Nominating Committee may employ other members of this Church to assist the Committee in its administrative work.
- (b) The Nominating Committee shall be appointed immediately following a Diocesan Convention to serve until the next Convention.

Section 4.

(a) The Nominating Committee shall establish in each calendar year a schedule for receiving nominations for offices to be filled and present such schedule to Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council shall approve or amend that schedule as it deems appropriate at its next meeting and direct that it be communicated to the Diocese promptly after such approval or amendment. The Nominating Committee may establish any schedule that seems reasonable given calendar considerations in any given year, provided that the schedule established by the Nominating Committee may not offer less time for informing the Diocese of open positions, receiving nominations and disseminating information on nominees than is provided in Canon 3, Sections 4(b),(c),(d), and (e) herein. Any nominations received after the deadlines set forth in the Nominating Committee's annual schedule for a given year shall be treated as "late nominations" which may then be offered as nominations from the floor of Convention.

- (b) At least ninety (90) days before a Convention at which elections for diocesan bodies are to be held, the Secretary shall send to:
 - (1) All the clergy entitled to vote,
 - (2) All the Clerks of the Vestries and of other bodies in union with this Diocese and
 - (3) the Nominating Committee, lists specifying:
 - (i) all the offices to be filled by election at the upcoming Convention and
 - (ii) the incumbents in each office whose terms are expiring, together with a statement as to whether each is eligible for reelection.
- (c) Clerical or lay delegates entitled to seats and votes in a forthcoming annual Convention and vestries of parishes and executive committees of missions may file nominations for the offices to be filled at the said Convention, prior to the assembling thereof. All such nominations shall be placed in writing and signed by either a clerical or lay delegate; shall be accompanied by information as to the residence, parish, and ecclesiastical status of each nominee; and shall be delivered to the Nominating Committee at least forty-five (45) days before the opening of the Convention; and the Nominating Committee shall then circulate the same among the parishes. Nominations, stating the information required above, may also be made from the floor of the Convention.
- (d) The Nominating Committee is to review all nominations, keeping in mind the requirements for the Districts of the Diocese to be represented on Diocesan Council by Members elected by and according to District as well as by members-at-large. (See Canon 6, Section 2). Where no nominations are forthcoming, the Committee is to communicate with parishes in the Districts so to advise them and request nominations. Whenever possible the Committee shall present multiple nominations for each vacancy; nevertheless, it shall make certain there is at least one nomination for each vacancy.
- (e) The Nominating Committee shall ascertain the willingness of each nominee to serve if elected. The Committee shall secure biographical data and a photograph of each nominee to be included in the nominee's profile. Whenever possible it shall prepare profiles of nominees to be made available throughout the Diocese at least thirty days prior to the Diocesan Convention.
- (f) The Nominating Committee shall be present at the Diocesan Convention to present the nominations predetermined in the form of a ballot on which the names of the nominees for each office shall be placed, as well as nominations made from the floor of the Convention, ascertaining first the willingness of such nominees to serve, if elected.
- (g) The Nominating Committee costs for communications, preparations and mailing and/or distribution of the profiles and Convention materials shall be borne by Convention.
- (h) Any ballot on which are marked more names than there are vacancies to be filled for a particular office shall be declared void, as to such office.

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Section 5.

All persons elected to office by the Convention must accept such office in writing to the Bishop or Secretary within thirty (30) days after the sending notification of such election by the Secretary of the Convention. The Secretary, within seven (7) days of the adjournment of any meeting of the Convention, shall send notification to each person elected to office, who has not already signed the acceptance, at such meeting that a written notice of acceptance is required. The form of acceptance shall state the office to which the person is elected and the requirements of this canon of written acceptance. In default of such acceptance within the time above specified the office shall be vacant and the vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided by the Canons.

CANON 4

Deputies to the General Convention

Section 1.

At the annual Convention no less than eighteen months before the General Convention, four presbyters or deacons and four lay persons shall be elected to represent this Diocese as Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 2.

At the annual Convention following the annual Convention at which Deputies were elected, four presbyters or deacons and four lay persons shall be elected as provisional Deputies to the General Convention.

Section 3.

The clerical Deputies shall each be a presbyter or deacon in active status within the Diocese at the time of the meeting of General Convention, and entitled to seats in the Convention of this Diocese, and the lay Deputies shall be communicants in good standing of this Church in this Diocese, but not necessarily domiciled within this Diocese.

Section 4.

It shall be the duty of the Deputies to signify to the Bishop, in writing, at least one month before the meeting of the General Convention, their acceptance of the appointment and intention to perform its duties. Provided that in case of any provisional Deputies' having had an

equal number of votes, the Bishop shall elect which of them to notify as aforesaid. And provided also that should there be an insufficient number of available provisional Deputies, the Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, may fill such vacancy.

CANON 5

Deputies to the Provincial Synod

Deputies to the Provincial Synod shall be appointed each year by the Bishop with the consent of the Standing Committee and in such manner as shall be deemed sufficient to provide adequate representation of the Diocese.

CANON 6

Diocesan Council

Section 1.

There shall be an executive body known as the Diocesan Council, which shall have charge of the unification, development, and prosecution of the work of Missions, Church Extension, Christian Education, and Christian Social Relations in the Diocese, shall perform such other work as may be committed to it by the Diocesan Convention, and shall assist the Bishop in the initiation and development of such new work between sessions of the Convention as the Bishop may deem necessary, subject, however, to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 2.

The Council shall be composed of:

- (a) The Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop Coadjutor and/or the Bishop Suffragan if there be such, and sixteen additional members, eight of whom shall be clergy, each either as presbyter or as deacon, canonically resident in the Diocese, and eight lay persons, communicants in good standing of the Church in the Diocese, including
 - (b) Five clergy and five lay persons, taken from the five Districts of the Diocese, which are:

Rochester District - The City of Rochester

Monroe District - Monroe County except for the City of Rochester

Northeast District - Ontario and Wayne Counties

Southeast District - Schuyler, Steuben and Yates Counties except for Hornell

Southwest District - Livingston and Allegany Counties plus Hornell

the boundaries of all of which Districts shall be determined by the Bishop and Diocesan Council by resolution not more frequently than annually, and the members of Council shall be elected as provided below:

- (1) Pursuant to authority granted by Convention, in even-numbered years, the clerical and lay delegates resident in each District, as specified in paragraph (h), shall at a duly called meeting of the District before Convention in such year elect one presbyter or deacon to represent that District for a term of two years, which presbyter or deacon shall be attached to a parish or other congregation in the District as described in paragraph (h), or shall have designated that District as such presbyter's or deacon's Diocesan Council District by so notifying the Secretary of the Convention in writing not less than thirty (30) days prior to the Diocesan Convention.
- (2) Pursuant to authority granted by Convention, in odd-numbered years, the clerical and lay delegates resident in each District, as specified in paragraph (h), shall at a duly called meeting of the District before Convention in such year elect one lay person to represent that District for a term of two years, which lay person shall be a member of a parish or other congregation in such District.
- (c) Three clergy and three lay persons shall be elected by and from the Diocese at large as follows:
 - (1) In odd-numbered years, the Convention shall elect three clergy, each to serve as a member-at-large for a term of two years.
 - (2) In even-numbered years, the Convention shall elect three lay persons, each to serve as a member-at-large for a term of two years.
- (d) No member or member-at-large who shall have served two full terms shall be eligible for re-election until at least one year shall have elapsed.
- (e) Any vacancy in the membership of the Council elected by District shall be filled by the respective District for the unexpired term within thirty days after the vacancy occurs by an election at a duly called meeting of the District.
- (f) Any vacancy in the membership of the Council elected by the Convention shall be filled within thirty days by the Council until the next annual meeting of the Convention, at which time, if the vacancy would continue thereafter, the Convention shall elect a member to complete the unexpired term.
- (g) The Chancellor, the Secretary and the Treasurer shall be *ex officio* members of the Council with seat and voice but without vote in the meetings of the Council.
 - (h) For the purpose of balloting under subparagraphs (b) (1) and (b) (2):
 - (1) "Clerical delegates resident in each District" shall mean those full or part time parochial presbyters and deacons otherwise entitled to vote in Convention, each of whom is a Rector of, assisting clergy of, or in charge of a parish or other congregation which has its place of worship in such District; and those non-parochial presbyters and deacons who, more than ninety days prior to the Diocesan Convention shall have designated that District as the Diocesan Council District of such presbyter or deacon by so notifying the Secretary of the Convention in writing.

(2) "Lay delegates resident in each District" shall mean those delegates otherwise qualified to vote in Convention, each of whom is a member of a parish or other congregation which has its place of worship in such District.

Section 3.

The Council shall meet annually before the meeting of the Convention of the Diocese, and at other times at its own appointment, or at the call of the Bishop or the call of three of its members. The Bishop of the Diocese, or, in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor or the Bishop Suffragan, if there be such, or, in the absence of a Bishop, the Vice-Chair, shall preside at the meetings of the Council, and eight (8) members and the Presiding Officer shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4.

The Council shall elect one of its members to be Vice-Chair. The Diocesan Secretary and Treasurer elected by the Convention shall be, ex officio, the Secretary and Treasurer, respectively, of the Council. The Council may elect an Assistant Treasurer and a Treasurer for Missionary Funds who shall hold office for such term and have such powers and duties as are prescribed by Canon 2. It shall also have power to elect such other officers and to employ such other persons as its work may require, fixing their duties and stipends, for terms not exceeding one year. Such other officers may include an Assistant Secretary who, with the approval of the Secretary, shall serve as secretary of Council and/or perform such other duties as the Secretary shall delegate.

Section 5.

- (a) Before the beginning of each fiscal year, the Council shall formulate the Budget as directed by the Convention, and shall receive and disburse all monies applicable thereto.
- (b) The Council shall each year establish an apportionment to be paid by each parish and each mission in support of the Diocesan Budget; and the Council shall publish such apportionments with the publication of the Diocesan budget and shall present the same to the Diocesan Convention for its approval at the Convention preceding the beginning of the fiscal year for which the apportionments are to be effective.

Section 6.

- (a) The Council shall organize Departments and shall determine the scope and power of each. The Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor and/or the Bishop Suffragan, if there be such, shall be *ex officio* members of each Department.
- (b) The Bishop, with the advice and consent of Council, may designate a member of the Diocesan Staff to meet with each department and with each subdivision thereof to accomplish liaison between the Bishop and Staff and each body. Such Staff member shall have seat and voice in the body but no vote.

Section 7.

The Council shall present an annual report to the Convention of the Diocese, which shall include:

- (a) a summary of its activities and those of the Departments;
- (b) statements covering receipts and disbursements in the administration of the Budget for the preceding fiscal year;
 - (c) a copy of the proposed Budget for the ensuing fiscal year.

Section 8.

The Council shall have authority to require such reports and statements from the parishes and missions as the successful prosecution of its work may necessitate and it shall be the duty of the respective parochial clergy and officers to furnish such information promptly.

Section 9.

The Council shall have power to adopt such By-Laws as are needed for the conduct of its affairs.

Section 10.

No appointed member of the Diocesan Staff shall be eligible to be elected to membership on the Diocesan Council.

Section 11.

No person shall hold office concurrently as a member or member-at-large of Diocesan Council, excepting as an *ex officio* member, and also as a member of the Standing Committee and/or as a Trustee of the Diocese.

CANON 7

Trustees of the Diocese

Section 1.

In compliance with a Resolution of the First Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester and of the Certificate of Incorporation of said Diocese, providing for the election of nine members to serve with the Bishop as the Board of Trustees, three members are to be elected annually by a plurality vote of the Convention for a term of three years.

Section 2.

The general powers, duties and responsibilities of the Trustees shall be as are set forth in Section 5 of the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York.

Section 3.

No presbyter, deacon, or lay person shall hold office concurrently as a Trustee, excepting any person who is a Trustee ex officio, and also as a member or member-at-large of Diocesan Council and/or as a member of the Standing Committee

CANON 8 Parish and Diocesan Properties

In conformity and consistent with the provisions of Title I, Canon 7, of the General Convention, it is hereby explicitly reaffirmed that all real and personal property held by or for the benefit of any Parish, Mission, Chapel, or Congregation located in the Diocese of Rochester is held in trust for the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Rochester. The existence of this trust, however, shall in no way limit the power and authority of the Parish, Mission, Chapel, or Congregation, or the power and authority of the Trustees of the Diocese holding title thereto, otherwise existing over such property so long as the particular Parish, Mission, Chapel, or Congregation remains a part of, and subject to, the Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Rochester and the Constitution and Canons of each of them.

Old Canon 8 defined the Diocesan Investment Trust, which was dissolved in 1988. New Canon 8, above, was substituted at the 1988 Convention.

CANON 9

Business Methods

(See General Convention Title I, Canon 7)

Section 1.

In this Diocese the following standard business methods shall be observed:

- (a) The Fiscal Year of the Diocese and of each parish and mission thereof shall begin January first.
- (b) Trust and permanent funds and all securities of whatsoever kind shall be deposited with a Federal or State Bank, or Trust Company, or a Diocesan Corporation, or with some other agency approved in writing by the Diocesan Council or its authorized agent under either a deed of trust or an agency agreement, providing for at least two signatures on any order of withdrawal of such funds or securities.
- (c) Records shall be made and kept of all trust and permanent funds showing source and date, terms governing the use of principal and income, to whom and how often reports of condition are to be made, and how the funds are invested.

- (d) Treasurers and custodians, other than banking institutions, shall be adequately bonded; except treasurers of funds that do not exceed \$500 at any one time during the fiscal year.
 - (e) Books of account shall be so kept as to provide the basis for satisfactory accounting.
- (f) All accounts shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant, or by such an accounting agency as shall be approved by the Diocesan Council or its authorized agent.
- (g) All accounts shall be audited, as reasonably determined by the Bishop, within ninety (90) days after either (1) the end of the month following the end of the tenure of a rector or preist-in-charge, or (2) the close of the parish's fiscal year following the end of the tenure of a rector or priest-in-charge. Such audit shall be performed by a certified public accountant or such an accounting agency as shall be approved by Diocesan Council or its authorized agent, except that such audit shall not be performed by an audit committee from the parish. The parish and the Diocesan Council shall mutually approve the Certified Public Accountant or accounting agency. The cost shall be borne by the Diocese.
- (h) Copies of any and all accounts shall be filed with the Diocesan Council or its authorized agent, who shall report annually thereon to the Convention.
 - (i) All buildings and their contents shall be kept adequately insured.
- (j) At the direction of the Bishop, the Diocese may establish a Human Resources Committee whose members shall be appointed by the Bishop. Such Committee shall address employment policies and matters for the Diocese.

Section 2.

- (a) No indebtedness shall be incurred by a parish, mission, congregation, or institution for permanent improvements, replacements, or additions to real estate, or equipment, without the written approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee.
- (b) No indebtedness shall be incurred by a parish, mission, congregation, or institution for current expenses without the written approval of the Bishop and Standing Committee, where the amount of such indebtedness, plus any existing indebtedness heretofore incurred for current expenses, exceed 20% of the total receipts for current expenses during the preceding fiscal year.
- (c) Whenever such approval is required, payment of all indebtedness must be provided for in a plan of amortization or other method of payment approved by said authority.
 - (d) This canon shall not apply to emergency repairs to real estate, buildings, or equipment.

CANON 10

The Admission of Churches

Section 1.

(a) To entitle a church to admission as a parish into union with the Church in this Diocese as represented in Convention, the Vestry of said church shall submit to the Convention, or to the Bishop and Standing Committee, the certificate of act of incorporation, or a copy thereof,

certified by the officer whose duty it is or may be to record or file certificates of incorporation according to the law of the State.

- (b) There shall also be submitted a certificate of the Bishop, that the incorporation of such church had received the Bishop's approbation before such act of incorporation, and that such church is duly and satisfactorily established; and that the Bishop has received satisfactory evidence that such church in addition to meeting its current expenses is able to maintain regular priestly services worked out on a contractual basis and, where applicable, at a salary level not in violation of the standards set by the Convention or the Bishop and Council, and to meet its annual premium to the Church Pension Fund.
- (c) Satisfactory testimony, by Certificate of the Rector, Missionary, or Warden, or otherwise, shall be given that not less than twenty-five persons of 18 years or more, members of such church, have habitually, for at least twelve months preceding such application, attended Divine Service in such church or congregation.
- (d) The application for admission shall be in writing, and shall be accompanied with a copy of a resolution adopted by the Vestry subsequent to incorporation, that such church agrees to abide by and conform to the Constitution and Canons in force within this Diocese, and to all the canonical and legal enactments thereof. Such copy shall be certified by the Secretary, or Clerk, the seal of the corporation affixed thereto, and shall be kept on file by the Registrar of the Diocese.
- (e) Upon approval by the Convention, or by the Bishop and Standing Committee, such parish shall thereupon be deemed in union with the Church in this Diocese as represented in Convention.

Section 2.

- (a) To entitle a church to admission as a mission into union with the Church in this Diocese as represented in Convention, the Warden and Clerk of said church shall submit to the Convention or to a committee thereof, a copy of the written consent of the Bishop of the Diocese to the organization of the mission according to the Canons of this Diocese, together with a copy of the minutes of the first Annual Election of the mission showing the name of the duly elected Warden, Clerk, Treasurer and other officers if any; a copy of the last Annual Report of the mission to the Bishop of the Diocese; a certificate from the Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester as to the vested property of the mission, if any, held by them; and a certificate from the Diocesan Council recommending admission of the mission into union with the Diocese.
- (b) The application for admission shall be in writing and shall be accompanied with a copy of a resolution, adopted by the congregation subsequent to the written approval of the Bishop for the formation of the mission, that such mission church agrees to abide by and conform to all canonical and legal enactments thereof. Such copy shall be certified by the Warden and Clerk and be authorized by the Minister-in-charge (if there be one), or by the Bishop of the Diocese, and shall be kept on file by the Registrar of the Diocese.

Section 3.

Whenever a parish or mission in union with the Church in this Diocese shall have failed to conform to the Constitution and canonical requirements of this Diocese and shall have been thereby debarred from seating delegates in the annual Convention of the Diocese, the said parish or mission shall be listed as temporarily out of union with the Diocese and such listing shall continue until the Diocesan Convention shall have restored it to the status of union with the Church in this Diocese.

CANON 11 Establishment of New Churches

Section 1.

No new church or chapel shall be established, or new congregation or church school gathered, nor shall the site of any existing church, chapel or church school building be changed, without the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese.

Section 2.

When it is desired to take any such action, a petition shall be presented to the Bishop, setting forth the site proposed for the new place of worship or church school building, as the case may be, and stating that notice of the proposed change of the site has been given by the Rector or Minister-in-charge to the congregation, at one public service on each of the three Sundays immediately preceding the filing of said petition.

Section 3.

As soon as may be after the receipt of said petition, the Bishop shall cause a copy of the same to be served, either personally or by registered mail, upon the Rector and Clerk or some member of the Vestry of each of the three parishes whose places of worship are nearest to the site of the new place of worship or church school building, together with a notice to said Rector and Vestry to appear before the Bishop and Standing Committee at a time named by the Bishop, not less then twenty days from the service of said notice, and show cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the petition should not be granted. Notice of the time and place of hearing shall be served in like manner upon the Rector and Clerk or some member of the Vestry of the petitioner.

Section 4.

Notice similar to that provided for in Section 3 may be given by the Bishop to any Rector or Minister-in-charge of a congregation, or Vestry, whose interests the Bishop may consider likely to be affected should the prayer of the petition be granted.

Section 5.

At the time named, the Bishop and Standing Committee shall hear any person or persons who may desire to be heard either for or against said petition. The Standing Committee shall promptly advise the Bishop of its opinion in the premises, and the reason or reasons upon which the same is based, and as soon as may be thereafter, the Bishop shall either grant or refuse the prayer of said petition, and file with the Secretary of the Convention such decision in writing.

Section 6.

If any of the Churches mentioned in Section 3 be without a Rector, service of the petition and notice upon the Clerk or a member of the Vestry, of said church shall be sufficient.

CANON 12

Vacant Cures

Section 1.

Whenever a church becomes vacant, it shall be the duty of the Vestry to give immediate notice to the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 2.

No election of a Rector shall be had until the name of the presbyter whom it is proposed to elect has been made known to the Bishop, if there be one (or to the Ecclesiastical Authority), and sufficient time, not exceeding thirty days, has been given to communicate with the Vestry thereon; nor until such communication, if made within that period, has been considered by the parish or Vestry at a meeting duly called and held for that purpose.

Section 3.

When a parish or mission is unable to hold services by reason of lack of clerical supply, the Bishop shall appoint those of the clergy in the Diocese who can with most convenience discharge the duty, to supply such vacant parishes as have been reported to the Bishop, at such times as may be deemed convenient and proper. It shall be the duty of such vacant churches thus supplied to defray all the expense incident to such occasional services.

Section 4.

The Bishop shall provide for lay reading whenever the supply of clerical services is impracticable.

CANON 13

Applications by Parishes for Diocesan Assistance

Section 1.

A congregation having been organized as a parish which is unable to support a Rector, or maintain the worship or work of the parish or fulfill the canonical obligation to the Convention of the Diocese may, with the consent of the Bishop, apply to the Council for a grant subject to such conditions and limitations as the Bishop and Council may impose.

Section 2.

Whenever it shall appear to the Bishop and the Council that a congregation organized as a parish has ceased to fulfill the requirements of a parish under the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York and under these Canons, they may recommend to the Convention that the parish be declared extinct; and if the Convention shall so declare, the Bishop may proceed to the organization of the congregation as a mission in accordance with the provisions of the Canons.

Section 3.

A congregation organized as a parish may voluntarily apply to the Bishop and the Council for reorganization as a mission under the provisions of this Canon.

Section 4.

Any congregation (a) whose Rector or other clergy are not in receipt of an over-all amount equal to the combined total minimum compensation, including salary, additional material provisions and expense allowances required by resolution of Convention, or, (b) which is unable adequately to maintain its property or support all other functions and services normally expected from a place of worship, shall by such fact be held to have applied to the Bishop for a grant-in-aid and to have subjected itself to the requirements of such a grant. The Diocesan Council shall be responsible for determining when the facts listed under (a) and (b) actually exist in any congregation and so certifying to the Bishop; and the Diocesan Council shall make annual reviews of such situations.

CANON 14 Organization of Missions

Section 1.

New congregations may be formed in the Diocese only with the consent and under the direction of the Bishop and subject to the provisions of Canon 11 on Establishment of New Churches. The Bishop shall have the right to form a congregation at any place in the Diocese where there is a sufficient number of persons requiring the ministrations of the Church and willing to contribute to the maintenance thereof.

Section 2.

Until such time as a congregation formed under the direction of the Bishop can qualify to be admitted as a mission church in union with the Convention of the Diocese, it shall be conducted as an unorganized mission and the Bishop shall from time to time appoint such ministers, officers and committees as its affairs require.

Section 3.

Such a congregation may become an organized missi	on church in the follow	ing manner:
(a) Application shall be made to the Bishop of the Dic	ocese in the following f	orm:
Dear Bishop: We the undersigned, residents of	, Town of	, County of
, within the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester,	desiring to establish in	n our midst the
regular and permanent ministrations of the Protestant E	Episcopal Church and to	o be numbered
with those who share in the fellowship and work of the	Convention of the said	Diocese and of
the General Convention, do respectfully petition to be re	eceived unto your spiri	itual charge and
direction and to be organized as a Mission Church in uni	ion with the Conventio	n of the Episcopa
Diocese of Rochester, under the name of		
"We do severally and collectively promise to provide	for the maintenance o	f said Mission
Church as the Bishop or other canonical authority shall f	from time to time requ	ire; and to work
faithfully and harmoniously to promote its influence in a	our neighborhood.	

"We promise conformity to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church and to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention and the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester."

To this petition shall be attached the signatures of only such persons who are baptized and have attained the age of 18 years.

- (b) If the Bishop approves the establishment of a congregation as an organized mission, the Bishop shall give consent thereto in writing, and shall appoint a provisional Executive Committee to serve until the first regular annual meeting of the congregation.
- (c) There shall be an annual meeting of the congregation of each organized mission church in the month of January on a day approved by the Bishop. Special meetings of the congregation may be held with the consent of the Bishop. Notice of all meetings shall be given as provided for a parish (see Canon 17, Section 2(a) (3), paragraphs 1 and 3). The presiding officer at all annual and special meetings of the organized mission shall be the Bishop or the Bishop's representative.

Only persons 18 years or more who have regularly attended its services of worship and have regularly contributed to its support for the sixty (60) days preceding, shall be qualified to vote in any meeting and to hold office in an organized mission; and the Warden shall be a communicant of the Church.

- (d) At the time of each annual meeting, an Executive Committee of not less than five (5) persons shall be elected to serve until the next annual meeting. The Executive Committee shall organize with the election of:
 - (1) a Warden;

- (2) a Clerk; and
- (3) a Treasurer of the congregation, who may be members of the mission at large. The Bishop, if present, shall preside in meetings of the Executive Committee; in the Bishop's absence the Minister-in-charge; and in the absence of both, the Warden.

Section 4.

The admission of an organized mission into union with the Convention shall be in accordance with the provisions of Canon 10, Section 2.

Section 5.

The title to all real estate acquired by an organized mission shall be vested in the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester and all trust funds of an organized mission shall be held and administered by the Trustees of the Diocese, until such time as the mission is incorporated as a parish in union with the Convention, when the title to its real estate and the custody of its trust funds shall be transferred to the parochial corporation.

Section 6.

The procedure for changing the status of an organized mission to that of a parish in union with the Convention shall be in accordance with the provisions of Canon 10, Section 1, and Canon 11.

Section 7.

An organized mission which has become incorporated as a parish but has not been admitted into union with the Convention as a parish, shall be organized and administered according to the provisions of the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York; save that it shall not be entitled to call a presbyter to be Rector, but shall accept a member of the clergy appointed by the Bishop to be Minister-in-charge; and that the representation of such a congregation in the Convention of the Diocese shall be that accorded an organized mission.

Section 8.

The provisions of the Canon shall apply to St. John's Chapel, Hobart College, Geneva, N.Y., only so far as it is consistent with the Canon entitled "Hobart College."

Section 9.

A parochial mission, chapel or branch church school may be established and organized by a parish, provided that the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee be first obtained in the manner specified in Canon 11, and provided said parish shall satisfy the Bishop and Standing Committee of its desire and ability to sponsor and financially support said parish mission, chapel or church school.

CANON 15 Hobart College

The Bishop of the Diocese is an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees of Hobart College.

St. John's Chapel is consecrated to the worship and service of Almighty God according to the ministry, doctrines, liturgy, rites and usages of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; and, by the instrument of donation and the statutes of the Trustees, is placed under the spiritual jurisdiction of the Bishop of this Diocese with the right to nominate the Chaplain.

The President of the College, if a Communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, shall *ex officio* hold the office of Warden of St. John's Chapel and the provisions of Canon 14 on "Organization of Missions", shall apply to the Chaplain only insofar as the same is consistent with the Chaplaincy Statutes of the Trustees.

If the President of Hobart College is not a Communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, the Bishop of the Diocese, upon recommendation of the President of Hobart College, shall appoint a Communicant of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America to be the Warden of St. John's Chapel. However, in that event, the President of Hobart College shall be entitled to a seat and voice without vote in the Convention.

St. John's Chapel is admitted as a church in union with the Convention and the cure shall consist of the students of Hobart College as defined by the statutes of the Trustees.

The Chapel shall have the status of an organized mission and as such is entitled to representation in the Convention as provided by Article III, Section 2(b) of the Constitution.

CANON 16 Districts

There shall be Districts of the Diocese as determined from time to time by the Bishop and Diocesan Council, the purpose of which shall be to provide a regional opportunity to exchange information among congregations and with the Diocese and to make recommendations and share in decision-making on the issues of importance to the congregations represented, on such matters as nominations to Diocesan Council (See Canon 6, Section 2(b)), the expenditure of discretionary funds and matters slated to come before the Annual Convention.

Former Canon 16 repealed 2001. New Canon 16 adopted 2001.

CANON 17

The Parish Organization

(See Religious Corporations Law, Art. II, Secs. 5 and 12; Art. III, Secs. 42 and 43. Also General Convention Title I, Canons 6 and 13)

Section 1. Organizing

A parish or mission shall be organized in accord with the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York insofar as it relates directly or indirectly to this Church. (See Canons 11 and 14.)

Section 2. Parish Meetings and Elections

- (a) (1) There shall be an annual meeting of the members of every parish on the day designated on its Certificate of Incorporation, for the purpose of electing Wardens and Vestry, and for the consideration and disposition of all other business devolving upon the meeting of the parish through the provisions of the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York or the Canons of the Diocese. If no day is specified in the Certificate, then the meeting shall be held on such day, either a Sunday or a secular day as may be determined by vote of the Vestry. For a parish incorporated after the enactment of Religious Corporations Law Art. III, Section 43, the meeting shall be held on the day, either a Sunday or a secular day, designated in its Certificate of Incorporation.
- (2) Special meetings of any parish may be held on any Sunday or secular day fixed by the Vestry.
 - (3) Notice of an annual or special meeting of the parish shall be read by the Rector of the parish, or if there be none, or if the Rector be absent, by the officiating member of the clergy, or by a Warden thereof, on each of two Sundays next preceding such annual or special meeting, in the time of divine service; or if, for any reason, the usual place of worship of the parish be not open for divine service, the notice shall be posted conspicuously on the outer door of the place of worship for two weeks next preceding the annual or special meeting. Such notice shall specify the place, day and hour of holding the annual or special meeting.

The notice of an annual meeting shall also specify the number and terms of office of each Warden and member of the Vestry whose terms of office shall then be vacant for any cause, and the office for which each such officer is to be then elected.

The notice of a special meeting shall also specify the matter or question to be brought before such meeting, and no matter or question not specified in such notice shall be acted on at such meeting.

(b) The presiding officer of such annual or special meeting shall be the Rector of the parish, if there be one; or if there be none, or the Rector be absent, one of the Wardens elected for the

purpose by a majority of the duly qualified voters present; or if no Warden be present, a member of the Vestry elected in like manner.

Such presiding officer shall be the judge of the qualifications of the voters; shall receive the votes cast and shall declare the meeting in the book of minutes of the Vestry, the officer shall sign such book, and have as many of the qualified voters present as the officer deems necessary also sign.

- (c) Persons of 18 years or more belonging to the parish, who have been baptized and are regular attendants at its worship and contributors to its support for at least twelve months prior to such annual or special meeting or since the establishment of such parish, shall be qualified voters at such annual or special meeting, unless the charter or By-Laws of said parish shall specify otherwise.
- (d) Any action of an annual or special meeting shall be determined by a majority of the qualified voters voting thereon.
- (e) By-Laws, as proposed by the Vestry or Trustees and consistent with the requirements of other governing authority, may be adopted or amended by a two-thirds vote of the qualified voters present and voting at the meeting, after written notice embodying such By-Laws or amendment, has been openly given at a previous meeting, and also in the notices of the meeting at which such proposed By-Laws or amendment is to be acted upon. By-Laws thus adopted or amended shall control the actions of the Trustees.
- (f) The polls of an election shall continue open for one hour and longer, in the discretion of the presiding officer, or if required by a vote of a majority of the qualified voters present and voting.

Section 3. The Vestry

- (a) At each annual meeting of the parish unless otherwise provided by its act of incorporation, one Warden shall be elected to hold office for two years; and one-third of the total number of members of the Vestry shall be elected to hold office for three years. Each Warden and member of the Vestry shall hold office after the expiration of the term and until a successor is chosen.
- (b) The Wardens and members of the Vestry who with the Rector constitute the Trustees of the parish, shall be elected by ballot from persons qualified to vote at such election; and no person shall be eligible for election as Warden unless such person also be a confirmed communicant in the Protestant Episcopal Church, nor be eligible for election to the Vestry, unless such person shall have been baptized. (For qualifications of voters, see Section 2 (c) above.)
- (c) No meeting of the Vestry or Trustees of any parish shall be held unless either all the members thereof are present, or three days' notice thereof shall be given to each member thereof, by the Rector in writing, either personally or by mail; or, if there be no Rector or if the Rector be incapable of acting, by one of the Wardens; except that twenty-four hours' notice of the first meeting of the Vestry after an annual election shall be sufficient, provided such meeting be held within three days after the election.

Should the Rector refuse or neglect to call a meeting of the Vestry or Trustees, the Clerk of the Vestry shall, on the written request of two-thirds of the whole Vestry, call a meeting of the same, by giving at least fifteen days' written notice to be served on each member of the Vestry personally; if personal service cannot be had, then upon such member by mailing the notice to the member's last known place of residence.

- (d) To constitute a quorum of the Vestry or Board of Trustees, there must be present either:
- (1) the Rector and at least a majority of the whole number of Wardens and members of the Vestry; or
- (2) one Warden and one more than a majority of the Vestry, or both Wardens and a majority of the members of the Vestry; or
- (3) if the Rector be absent from the diocese and shall have been so absent for over four calendar months; or if the meeting be called by the Rector and the Rector be absent therefrom or be incapable of acting, one Warden and a majority of the members of the Vestry, or both Wardens and one less than a majority of the members of the Vestry.
- (e) If there be a Rector of the parish, no measure shall be taken in the Rector's absence, in any case, for effecting the sale or disposition of the real property of the corporation, nor for the sale or disposition of the capital or principal of the personal property of the corporation, nor shall any act be done which shall impair the rights of such Rector.
- (f) The presiding officer of the Vestry shall be the Rector, or if there be none, or the Rector be absent, the Warden who shall be called to the chair by a majority of the votes, if both Wardens be present, or the Warden present, if but one be present.
- (g) The Vestry shall have power to fill a vacancy occurring in the office of a Warden or member of the Vestry by death, resignation or otherwise than by expiration of term, until the next annual election, at which, if such vacancy would continue thereafter, it shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term.
- (h) If vacancies exist in the offices of Wardens or members of the Vestry in such number that a quorum is not in office at any time, the Rector shall forthwith call a special meeting of the parish for the filling of such vacancies. If there be no Rector the Warden longest in office shall call such special meeting.

Notice of such special meeting shall be read by the Rector, or if there be none, or the Rector be absent, by the officiating member of the clergy or by one of the Wardens, on the Sunday next preceding such meeting in the time of divine service. If for any reason the usual place of worship of the parish be not open for divine service on such Sunday, such notice shall be posted conspicuously on the outer door of the place of worship for one week next preceding the meeting. Such notice shall conform to that required for an annual election. Such vacancies shall be filled at such election for the remainder of the unexpired terms.

(i) (1) The Vestry as the Trustees of the incorporated parish are the custodians of its real and personal property and its agents and legal representatives in all matters concerning its corporate affairs, subject always to the Religious Corporations Law and the Canons of the Diocese and General Convention. A Vestry may not convey title, mortgage, or encumber the real property of a parish or divert any of its endowments, or in any way alienate any said

- property of a parish from the use of this Church in the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester without the previous consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee. (See General Convention Title I, Canon 7)
- (2) The Vestry is the agent and legal representative of the parish in all matters concerning the relations of the parish to its clergy. It is its duty to elect and call a Rector and to provide for the Rector's maintenance, and all expenses incident to the worship and work of the parish. (See General Convention Title I, Canon 13, Section 2).
- (3) The Vestry shall elect a Secretary or Clerk who need not be one of its members to take and record the minutes of its proceedings and of all annual and special meetings of the incorporated parish, attest the public acts of the Vestry and the meetings of the incorporated parish, preserve all records and papers belonging to the incorporated parish, not otherwise provided for, perform such duties as shall be legally assigned to the Clerk, and faithfully deliver to the successor in office, all books and documents in the Clerk's possession belonging to the incorporated parish.
- (4) The Vestry shall elect a parish Treasurer, who need not be one of its members, whose duty it shall be to receive, disburse, and account for the funds of the incorporated parish. Such Treasurers shall be bonded in accordance with the Canons.
- (5) When for any reason the parish shall be without the services of a Rector it shall be the duty of the Wardens to provide for the regular services of worship and occasional ministrations either by the temporary employment of a member of the clergy or lay reader, and if the Rector, from disability or any other cause, neglect to perform the regular services in the parish, and refuse without good cause, consent to any other duly qualified member of the clergy of this Church to officiate within the cure, the Vestry shall have power, with the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, to permit any duly qualified member of the clergy of this Church to officiate.
- (6) It is the duty of the Vestry to make the work embodied in the program of the Diocese and the program of the General Church known to the parishioners, and to provide for the payment of the apportionment for the Diocesan budget to support the work of the Diocese and the General Church by including the same in its budget for current expenses, and transmitting one-twelfth thereof to the Diocesan Treasurer each month. (See Canon 6.)
- (7) The Vestry is jointly responsible with the Rector for furnishing the Bishop at every visitation with such information as the Bishop may request concerning the spiritual and temporal affairs of the parish; and to furnish on a form authorized by the General Convention a report covering the year ending on the 31st day of the preceding December, which report shall be sent to the Bishop, or other person designated by the Bishop. (See Canon 18, Section 2(a))
- (8) The Vestry is required by the Canons of the General Convention to approve the application of any communicant of the parish before admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders and for ordination to the diaconate and to the priesthood.
- (9) The Vestry shall have power to make such By-Laws as are necessary for the performance of its duties and which are not inconsistent with the provisions of the certificate of

incorporation of the parish, the corporations laws of the State of New York, or the Canons of the Diocese or the General Convention. Any proposed parish By-Law, amendment thereto, or amendment to the Certificate of Incorporation shall be submitted to the Chancellor at least thirty (30) days prior to its publication at any meeting; and, either the proposal shall be conformed to the Chancellor's advice, or the Chancellor's comments about the proposal shall be read aloud to the meeting before any vote is taken.

Section 4. Acceptance of Election to Office

All persons elected to office in any parish must accept such office in writing to the presiding officer within thirty days after the mailing to them of written notification by the presiding officer of such election. The presiding officer within seven days of the adjournment of the meeting at which such election occurred shall send written notification by mail to each person elected to office at such meeting. The notification shall state the office to which the person is elected and the requirements of this Canon of written acceptance. In default of such acceptance within the time above specified the office shall be vacant and the vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided for such office.

CANON 18

Parish Records and Reports

Section 1.

- (a) Every member of the clergy officiating in this Diocese shall keep a Parish Register of baptisms, confirmations, communicants, marriages, and burials, and of the families and individuals within the cure.
 - (b) The Register to be kept in the parish shall specify:
- (1) The name, and place and date of birth, of the child or adult baptized, with the names of the parents, and sponsors or witnesses, signed by the officiating member of the clergy.
 - (2) The name, and place and date of birth of person confirmed.
- (3) The names of all communicants within the member of the clergy's cure, with the time of their admission or reception to communion in the same, and of death, removal or transfer. There shall also be indicated the names of those whose domicile is unknown, and those whose domicile is known but are inactive.
- (4) The names, ages and residences of the persons married and their witnesses, signed by the officiating member of the clergy.
- (5) The names, ages and residences of the persons buried, signed by the officiating member of the clergy.
 - (6) The time when, and the place where, each rite was performed.
- (7) The names of all the families and individuals within cure, as nearly as can be ascertained.

- (c) These entries shall be made by the member of the clergy in a book provided for that purpose by the Vestry of the parish, the mission, or the incorporated religious society under which the member is at work, and approved as suitable by the Bishop; which book shall be the Parish Register and shall be preserved as part of the records of the church, by the member of the clergy, or in the case of a vacant parish or mission, by a Warden.
- (d) Such Register shall be always open to inspection by the Bishop, or by any person authorized by the Bishop, and also, in the case of a mission, by an authorized representative of the Diocesan Council.
- (e) A member of the clergy resigning the charge of a parish or mission shall deliver the Register, with the requisite entries complete, to the successor in office, or to a Warden, and take a receipt therefor.
- (f) Whenever a parish or mission or other incorporated religious society, shall cease to function and be abandoned for any cause, other than the uniting with or being absorbed by another parish, the Rector or missionary, or if there be none, the Warden or official head shall deliver to the Bishop for safe keeping the Parish Register, and the Bishop shall place the same in the Diocesan Archives.

Section 2.

- (a) It shall be the joint duty of the Rector and Vestry of every parish, and of the Minister-incharge and Warden of every mission, to prepare upon the blank form adopted by the General Convention, a report for the year ending December 31st preceding, and to deliver the same on or before the first day of February in every year to the Bishop of the Diocese, or to the person designated by the Bishop to receive it; or, when there is no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Convention. A grace period of not more than thirty days will be allowed before a parish is considered non-reporting. [See subsection (e)]. This report shall include the following information:
 - (1) The number of baptisms, confirmations, marriages, and burial during the year; the total number of baptized persons and communicants at the time of the report;
 - (2) A summary of all receipts and expenditures from whatever source derived, and for whatever purpose used; and
 - (3) A statement of the property held by the parish, whether real or personal, with an appraisal of its value, together with a statement of the indebtedness of the parish, if any, and of the amount of insurance carried.
- (b) It shall be the duty of every member of the clergy not in charge of any parish or congregation to report any occasional services, and if there have been none the causes or reasons which have prevented the same.
- (c) The parochial and personal reports, or such parts of them as the Bishop may deem proper, shall be entered in The Journal.
- (d) It shall be the duty of the Bishop of the Diocese to pass upon all reports of which there may be any doubt as to the accuracy or completeness of the information rendered and to

return all reports which do not conform to the requirements of this Canon to the parish or mission and member of the clergy making the same, with the request that the report be made conformable to these requirements.

(e) At the time of the annual Diocesan Convention all parishes and missions which have failed to make and file the report as required by this Canon shall be counted as Non-Reporting.

Section 3.

Communicants removing from one parish to another, or wishing their names to be transferred from the list of communicants in one parish to the list of communicants in another without changing their residence, shall procure a certificate of good standing as communicants, as provided for in the Canons of the General Convention.

CANON 19

Family Instruction

Section 1.

Every member of the clergy in charge of a congregation shall give or cause to be given, to both adults and children, regular instruction in the relation of the Church and the family; which instruction shall include the duties and responsibilities of membership in a family, the mutual obligations and privileges of spouses and of parents and children, and the Christian doctrine and discipline of marriage, together with the particular ministrations of the Word and Sacraments and the work and worship of the Church of which the family and its members have need for the fulfillment of the Christian life.

Section 2.

Every member of the clergy in charge of a congregation shall, in exercising pastoral ministry, take care to make the family a basic unit and objective of such effort.

CANON 20

Diocesan Societies and Institutions

Section 1.

No institution, society, or corporation shall represent itself to be an institution of the Diocese of Rochester for the purpose of soliciting money, or for any other purpose, unless it shall have qualified and shall continue to qualify as a diocesan institution as provided herein.

Section 2.

In order to qualify as a diocesan institution, each institution shall be incorporated as a charitable or non-profit corporation under the applicable provisions of the laws of the State of New York and shall duly maintain such corporate status.

Section 3.

In addition to the matters required by the applicable laws of the State of New York, the Certificate of Incorporation or By-Laws of any such institution shall contain the following provisions:

- (a) That the Bishop shall always be a member of the Board of Directors or Trustees of the institution, either *ex officio* or by election, as appropriate.
- (b) That at least a majority of the Board of Directors shall be members in good standing of a parish or mission of the Diocese of Rochester, or presbyters canonically resident in that Diocese.
- (c) That the institution shall not alienate or encumber real property belonging to it without first obtaining the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee.
- (d) That the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and in this Diocese, as they are now and as they may be amended, shall be a part of the By-Laws of such institution and that in case of conflict between said Constitutions and Canons, and said By-Laws, the provisions of said Constitutions and Canons shall be paramount.

Section 4.

The Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws shall be submitted to the Chancellor of the Diocese not less than sixty (60) days prior to the meeting of the Convention at which approval is sought. The Chancellor shall examine such Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws to determine whether they meet the requirements herein set forth and whether they are otherwise in proper form, and shall transmit the same to the Secretary of the Convention, together with the Chancellor's written recommendation as to approval or disapproval. The Secretary shall then present the matter to Convention for action.

Section 5.

A true copy of the Certificate of Incorporation of such institution and of any amendments thereof, duly certified by the Secretary of such institution, shall be filed with the Secretary of Convention, and shall be open to inspection at all times by the Ecclesiastical Authority or any person or persons duly delegated by said Authority.

Section 6.

Each diocesan institution shall make a written annual report to the Convention, setting forth its financial transactions and other activities during the previous year.

Section 7.

The Secretary of the Convention shall report the names of all institutions qualified under this Canon, and their activities, in the Journal each year.

Section 8.

This Canon shall apply to existing institutions as well as to those which may be organized in the future. If the Certificate of Incorporation or By-Laws of existing institutions do not conform to the requirements of this Canon, they shall be amended accordingly.

Section 9.

In case of any institution which shall have a provision in its Certificate of Incorporation or By-Laws for the election of a member or members of its Board of Directors by the Convention, such member or members shall be elected by the Convention in the manner prescribed by the Rules of Order.

Section 10.

The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have the power of visitation of any diocesan institution and power to examine its books, minutes, records, and affairs, to determine whether such institution conforms and continues to conform to the provisions of this Canon, and whether its standards and performances of work and service are sufficiently high to warrant continued recognition as a diocesan institution. If, in the opinion of the Ecclesiastical Authority, any institution shall fail to meet such requirements, the Authority may so report to Convention, with the reasons and recommendations, whereupon Convention may take such action as in its discretion may be deemed appropriate, either to correct undesirable conditions or to end the status of such institution as a diocesan institution.

CANON 21 Ecclesiastical Discipline

Section 1. Title IV of the Canons of The Episcopal Church

The ecclesiastical discipline of Clergy shall be governed by Title IV of the Canons for the Government of The Episcopal Church, as from time to time amended ("Title IV"). To the extent, if any, that any of the provisions of this Canon are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV, the provisions of Title IV shall govern. Capitalized terms in this Canon shall have the meaning as set forth in Title IV.

Section 2. Disciplinary Board Structure

(a) **Disciplinary Board.** There is hereby established a Disciplinary Board consisting of seven (7) members, four (4) of whom shall be Clergy, canonically resident in the Diocese, and three (3) of whom shall be lay adult ("Lay") Communicants in Good Standing in the Diocese.

(b) Election.

- (1) Members of the Disciplinary Board shall be elected by the Convention. Each member shall serve a three (3) year term; except, if a member is elected to fill a vacancy, the term of such member shall be the unexpired term of the member being replaced. The terms of the members shall commence immediately following election. The terms of office of the Disciplinary Board shall be staggered and arranged into three classes. The first class shall consist of two (2) members (one Clergy, one Lay), the second class shall consist of two (2) members (one clergy, one Lay), and the third class shall consist of three (3) members (two Clergy, one Lay).
- (2) No member shall be eligible for reelection for a year after the end of the second consecutive full term. Each member serving a one year term ending in 2012 or a two year term ending in 2013 shall not be deemed to have served a full term. No Members of the Standing Committee or any person serving as Chancellor, Assistant Chancellor, Advisor, Conciliator, Church Attorney, Intake Officer, Investigator, or any member of the diocesan staff shall be eligible to serve on the Disciplinary Board.
- (c) Vacancies. Vacancies on the Disciplinary Board shall be filled as follows:
 - (1) Upon the determination that a vacancy exists in accordance with Title IV.5.3 (a) and (b), the President of the Disciplinary Board shall notify the Bishop of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced.
 - (2) The Bishop, in consultation with the Standing Committee, shall appoint a replacement Board member of the proper class and who meets the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Disciplinary Board members.
 - (3) With respect to a vacancy created for any reason other than pursuant to a challenge as provided below, the term of any person selected as a replacement Disciplinary Board member shall continue until the next annual Convention. With respect to a vacancy resulting from a challenge, the replacement Disciplinary Board member shall serve only for the proceedings for which the elected Disciplinary Board member is serving as a result of the challenge.
- (d) **Removal**. A Disciplinary Board member may be removed from office by the Bishop, whenever in the judgment of the Bishop the best interests of the Diocese would be so served. The Disciplinary Board member so removed may appeal the removal to the Diocesan Council.

Section 3. Concerning Impartiality

In any proceeding under this Canon, if any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel shall become aware of a personal conflict of interest, undue bias, or any grounds as set forth in Title IV.19.14 or IV.19.15, that member shall immediately notify the President of the

Disciplinary Board and request a replacement member be appointed to the Panel. Respondent, Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The members of the Panel, who are not the subjects of the challenge, shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in that proceeding.

Section 4. President

Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, following at least seven (7) calendar days' written or electronic notice, the Board shall convene in person or by electronic communication to elect by majority vote of the entire Disciplinary Board a President from among its members to serve for the current year.

Section 5. Intake Officers

One or more Intake Officers shall be appointed from time to time by the Bishop, each of whom shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop. The Bishop shall appoint one or more Intake Officers according to the needs of the Diocese. The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese together with an explanation that any person knowing or reasonably believing an Offense may have been committed by a member of Clergy shall be encouraged to make such complaint known to an Intake Officer. An Intake Officer need not reside in the Diocese or be a Member of the Church.

Section 6. Investigator

When appropriate, the Bishop shall appoint an Investigator in consultation with the President of the Disciplinary Board. The Investigator may, but need not, reside in the Diocese or be a Member of the Church.

Section 7. Church Attorney

The Bishop shall annually appoint one or more attorneys to serve as Church Attorney, in consultation with the Standing committee, for the following year. The person(s) so selected must be a duly licensed attorney, but need not be a Member of the Church or reside within the Diocese. The Bishop, acting in consultation with the Standing Committee, may remove a Church Attorney for cause. In the event of vacancy, the Bishop may appoint a successor Church Attorney, in consultation with the Standing Committee, and said successor shall serve until the next Diocesan Convention.

Section 8. Pastoral Response Coordinator

The Bishop shall provide for an appropriate pastoral response whenever any report is made to the Intake officer. The Bishop may appoint a pastoral response coordinator, to serve at the pleasure of the Bishop, to coordinate the delivery of appropriate pastoral care provided for in

Title IV.8. Such person may be the Intake Officer, but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under Title IV or this Canon.

Section 9. Advisors

The Bishop shall make available an Advisor for the Complainant and an Advisor for the Respondent. Persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position provided for under this Canon, and shall not include the Chancellor or Assistant Chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.

Section 10. Clerk

The Board shall appoint a Clerk who shall be the custodian of all records and files of the Disciplinary Board and who shall assist the Board with records management and administrative support. The Clerk may be a member of the Board. All records maintained by the Clerk shall be deposited in the Diocesan Archives at the completion of the matter.

Section 11. Costs and Expense

- (a) The reasonable costs and expenses of the Disciplinary Board, the Intake Officer, the Investigator, the Church Attorney, the Clerk and the pastoral response coordinator shall be the obligation of the Diocese and paid by the Treasurer, in consultation with the Trustees and/or Diocesan Council as deemed appropriate by the Treasurer.
- (b) The reasonable defense fees and costs incurred by a Respondent may be paid or reimbursed by the Diocese, in whole or in part, as follows:
 - (1) In the event of a final Order dismissing the complaint, and a finding made by the Hearing Panel that the matter was without basis in fact, brought in bad faith, or was frivolous; or
 - (2) In the event of dismissal by an Accord approved by the Bishop, if such Accord provides that the matter was without basis in fact, brought in bad faith, or was frivolous; or
 - (3) In the event of a determination made by the Bishop or Standing Committee that in the interests of justice such payment or reimbursement is proper. The Respondent may make application to the Bishop and the Standing Committee for the payment or reimbursement of Respondent's reasonable defense fees and costs.

Section 12. Records of Proceedings

Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk

Section 13. Permanent Records

The Bishop shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Canon at the Diocese and the Archives of the Episcopal Church, as prescribed in Title IV.

Section 14. Meetings by Electronic Communication

Any meeting required under these disciplinary canons, other than a hearing at which evidence may be taken or examined, may be conducted either in person or through telephonic or other electronic communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time.

Section 15. Hearing Panel

In appointing members of a Hearing Panel the President of the Disciplinary Board shall endeavor to ensure an adequate level of legal expertise among its members and in the event that is not possible, the President may authorize the Disciplinary Board to engage the services of an attorney to advise the Hearing Panel on legal issues or of other qualified individuals to advise on technical or scientific matters.

Section 16.

The Bishop, with the consent of Standing Committee, is empowered to negotiate and enter into agreements with other dioceses within the Church for mutual cooperation with and assistance in effectuating the language and intent of this Canon. Such agreements may include creation of panels of advisors, advocates, and attorneys to serve as resources to the Diocese in the application of this Canon.

CANON 22 The Clergy List

Section 1.

The Bishop shall prepare, or cause to be prepared and kept by the Secretary:

- (a) A list of all canonically resident clergy who hold a parochial cure. This list shall provide the "whole number of parochial clergy" mentioned in Article VIII of the Constitution.
- (b) A list of all canonically resident clergy who do not hold a parochial cure. This list, together with the list in Section 1(a) (above), shall constitute the list of clergy entitled to vote under Article VIII.
- (c) A list of all clergy ministering by license in charge of parishes or other cures.

Section 2.

Such lists shall be registered by the Secretary of the Diocesan Convention, under the supervision of the Bishop.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Diocesan Convention shall preserve on file all canonical certificates that shall be presented to the Bishop concerning the election and institution of ministers, provided that the same be accompanied with the certificate of the Bishop that the member of the clergy chosen to any cure, church or parish, in this Diocese, is a member of the clergy of this Church. The Secretary shall also record other certificates transmitted to the Secretary by the Bishop.

Section 4.

- (a) When Letters Dimissory shall have been accepted, the member of the clergy received shall procure from the Bishop a certificate that the member has been received into the Diocese, in compliance with the Canons. The member shall deliver such to the Secretary of the Diocesan Convention, who shall record the same. A record thus made shall be evidence of the Canonical residence of such member.
- (b) The Bishop shall also certify in writing to the Secretary the name of any member of the clergy who shall in any way become canonically resident within the Diocese, to be duly recorded.
- (c) The Bishop shall indicate to the Secretary the name of every member of the clergy of the Diocese deceased, transferred, deposed, suspended, or otherwise disqualified during the year preceding an annual session of the Diocesan Convention; of which record shall thereupon be made by the Secretary.
- (d) All records in these Canons provided for, duly exhibited, or transcript of the same attested by the Secretary, shall be admitted in evidence upon all proceedings or trials, under any law or Canon in force in this Diocese.

CANON 23 Church Pension Fund

In conformity with the legislation adopted by the General Convention of 1913, pursuant to which the Church Pension Fund was duly incorporated; and in conformity with the "Church Pension Fund" Canon of the General Convention, as amended; the Diocese of Rochester hereby accepts said Fund as the authorized and approved pension system for the clergy of the Church and their dependents, and declares its intention of supporting this Fund in accordance with its rules.

CANON 24

Commission on Ministry

Section 1. Membership

- (a) The Commission on Ministry shall consist of not more than nineteen (19) nor less than nine (9) persons, no more than a simple majority of which may be from either the clerical or lay order.
- (b) The Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor and the Bishop Suffragan, if there be such, shall be *ex officio* members of the Commission. The Bishop(s) shall not be counted in the "simple majority" requirement of this Canon.
- (c) The Annual Convention shall elect at least a simple majority of the members of the Commission, the remaining number to be appointed by the Bishop. No person shall hold office concurrently as a member of the Commission on Ministry, excepting *ex officio* members, and also as a member of the Standing Committee. The Secretary shall assure that the lists of members required by Canon 2, Section 1 are published in the *Journal* each year.
- (d) The term of the membership on the Commission shall be three years. No one elected or appointed for two full consecutive terms shall be eligible for membership until the Annual Convention following the expiration of the member's term. The Bishop's appointments shall be considered to have been made at the time of the Annual Convention.
- (e) Vacancies among the elected membership of the Commission occurring between Annual Conventions shall be filled by appointment by the Bishop with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee. Members so appointed shall serve until the next Annual Convention.
 - (f) The Chair of the Commission shall be elected annually by the Commission.

Section 2. Duties

- (a) The duties of the Commission shall be those set forth in the Canons of the Episcopal Church, together with such other such duties as the Bishop may appropriately assign.
- (b) At the discretion of the Bishop, the Commission on Ministry in the Diocese may join with like Commissions of other dioceses in fulfilling its responsibilities.

Section 3. Working Rules

The Commission shall have the power to devise its own rules of order and/or By-Laws for its own governance, not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

Section 4.

The Commission shall report to each Annual Convention of the Diocese.

CANON 25

Arms and Seal of the Diocese

Section 1.

The arms of the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester hereinafter described are derived from the Arms of the Anglican Diocese of Rochester.

Argent, a saltire gules between a fountain proper in the center chief point, and three mitres of the second garnished or.

The three mitres are symbolic of the three Sees of which the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester was formerly a part, viz., London, New York, and Western New York; and the fountain is symbolic of the Genesee River which flows the length of the Diocese from south to north.

Section 2.

The official seal shall be held in the custody of the Bishop of the Diocese and shall be used to authenticate all official acts of the Bishop or of the Convention of the diocese.

CANON 26

The Bishop and the Cathedral

Section 1.

The Bishop with the approval of the Diocesan Council may, from time to time, or until a Diocesan Cathedral shall be established upon a proper and permanent foundation, and with the consent of the Rector, Wardens, and Vestry, select a parish church as the Bishop's Church, which may also be known as the Cathedral and Parish Church of (here insert the name of the parish.)

Section 2.

The Bishop with the approval of the Diocesan Council may enter into such stipulations in writing with the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of such church touching upon the Bishop's rights in the use of the church building and in parochial affairs, as may be agreed upon, and as embodied in "The Institutes of the Cathedral."

CANON 27

Removal For Absences of Members of Diocesan Bodies, Vestries and Executive Committees

Section 1.

(a) The members of any Diocesan body, as defined in this section, by majority vote of all members then serving, and with the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, may remove from

office any member who shall have failed to attend three (3) successive regular meetings of the body without excuse by the chairperson of the body.

(b) For purposes of this section, the term "Diocesan body" shall mean the Trustees of the Diocese, the Standing Committee, Diocesan Council, and the Commission on Ministry.

Section 2.

Unless otherwise provided by the Certificate of Incorporation or the By-Laws of the parish, the Vestry of any parish, by majority vote of all persons then serving, may remove from office any Warden or Vestry member who shall have failed to attend three (3) successive regular meetings of the Vestry without excuse by the Rector, or if there is no Rector, a Warden.

Section 3.

The Executive Committee of any organized mission church, by majority vote of all persons then serving, may remove from office any Warden or Executive Committee member who shall have failed to attend three (3) consecutive regular meetings of the Executive Committee without excuse by the Minister-in-charge; or if there is no Minister-in-charge, the Warden or in the case of a Warden, a member of the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

Any vacancy created by such removal shall be filled as provided by New York State law or the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, or, if not so provided, by a majority vote of the persons remaining in office.

CANON 28 Interpretation of Canons and Miscellaneous Provisions

Section 1

In the interpretation of all Canons, words of the masculine gender shall include the feminine.

Section 2

- (a) Any meeting required under these Constitution and Canons, other than a hearing at which evidence may be taken or examined, may be conducted either in person or, in whole or in part, through telephonic or other electronic communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time.
- (b) Any notices, consents, acknowledgments, signatures, writings, written communications or similar actions may be provided by electronic mail. Such actions shall be deemed to be given at the time of their transmission. If a notice period for facsimile, telegraph or similar means of communication is specified, such period shall apply to electronic notices.

CANON 29 Amendment and Repeal

All proposals to alter, amend, or repeal these Canons shall first be submitted in writing to the Secretary of the Diocese and by the Secretary submitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons at least ninety (90) days before the annual meeting of the Convention of the Diocese, and after consideration and recommendation by that Committee shall be delivered into the hands of the Secretary of the Diocese at least one month before the opening of the Convention and the Secretary shall then circulate the same among the parishes, unless by a two-thirds vote of each Order the Convention shall consent to suspend the time requirement; and then approved by a majority vote in each Order at two successive Conventions, or by a two-thirds vote in each Order at the Convention at which the resolution is introduced. When so adopted it shall become effective at the close of the Convention.

RULES OF ORDER

- 1. The Convention shall include a celebration of the Holy Communion and an address by the Bishop, either of which shall be in order at any time.
- 2. Report of the Committee on Credentials.
- 3. When a quorum of Clerical and Lay Delegates are present, the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention open for business.
- 4. Election of a Secretary and Treasurer (every fifth year).
- 5. Election of an Assistant Secretary.
- 6. Appointment of the following Convention Committees:
 - (a) On Elections, a Chief Teller and other fit persons

- (b) On Credentials, one Clerical and two Lay Delegates
- (c) On Dispatch of Business, one Clerical and one Lay Delegate
- 7. Granting of the courtesy of the Convention to non-delegates.
- 8. Report of the Committee on Dispatch of Business.
- 9. Nominations from the prepared ballot and from the floor.
- 10. Elections, casting the first ballot for the following:
 - (a) Standing Committee
 - (b) Trustees of the Diocese
 - (c) Diocesan Council
 - (d) Commission on Ministry
 - (e) Deputies to the General Convention (eighteen months prior to each General Convention)
 - (f) Provisional Deputies to the General Convention (one year after election of Deputies)
 - (g) Disciplinary Board
- 11. Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.
- 12. Confirmation by the Convention of the nomination by the Bishop of the Chancellor (triennially).
- 13. Communications from Secretaries of General, or Diocesan Conventions or of the Provincial Synod.
- 14. Acceptance of reports by title or presentation of reports for action where appropriate:
 - (a) Commission on Ministry
 - (b) Treasurer of the Diocese
 - (c) Trustees of the Diocese
 - (d) Diocesan Council and Departments
 - (e) Standing Committee
 - (f) Registrar
- 15. Report of Committee on Resolutions
- 16. Presentation of the following reports for action, or on request of the Bishop, or on recommendation of the Committee on Dispatch of

Business:

- (a) Special Committees of the last Convention
- (b) Special Committees Appointed by the Bishop or Diocesan Council
- (c) Special Committees of this Convention
- 17. Miscellaneous and unfinished business.
- 18. Appointment by the Presiding Officer of the following:
 - (a) Standing Committees of Convention
 - (1) Committee on Constitution and Canons
 - (2) Committee on Resolutions
 - (3) Committee on Nominations
 - (4) Special Committees to report to the next Convention
 - (5) A Committee to read, correct and approve the minutes
 - (6) Committee on Arrangements
 - (b) A Registrar
 - (c) An Archivist
- 19. No rule of order shall be suspended, varied, amended or rescinded unless by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- 20. Unless otherwise provided in these <u>Rules of Order</u>, <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u> shall prevail in the conduct of business.
- 21. Committee Procedures
 - (a) Resolutions Committee

The Committee on Resolutions shall be responsible for receiving all resolutions except those proposed by the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, the Commission on Ministry, and District, or General Convention Deputies.

(1) All miscellaneous resolutions to be considered for action by the Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention in writing and signed by the proposer at least sixty (60) days before the date of Convention. Resolutions should be submitted on white 8 ½ x 11 paper, typed and double spaced, or electronically in a .doc format, and contain two sections:

the <u>Resolved</u> specifying the desired action; and a further <u>Resolved</u>, as appropriate, providing for the implementation of the resolution if adopted. A separate, brief supporting statement may accompany the resolution. After the expiration of the sixty (60) day deadline, the Secretary

- shall transmit to the committee all resolutions so submitted.
- (2) The Committee on Resolutions shall prepare the proposed resolutions for consideration by the Convention, exercising the right of editorial judgment on any resolution, in consultation with the proposer, or choosing between several resolutions offered on the subject or relating them to one another in a final version.
- (3) The Committee shall at least fifty (50) days before the date of Convention submit its report to the Secretary with its recommendation for action upon each resolution. This report shall be distributed to the delegates by publication, by mail or otherwise at least thirty (30) days before the date of Convention.
- (4) Any resolution from the floor shall be permitted only if reviewed and approved for presentation by the Resolutions Committee and only upon majority vote by the Convention approving consideration of the resolution. Such resolution should be duplicated in advance by the proposer(s)," with sufficient copies (350) available for distribution to the officers and delegates.
- (b) Committee on Arrangements

The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for receiving post-Convention recommendations, and from such recommendations to make referrals in the following areas:

- (1) To the Ecclesiastical Authority recommendations pertaining to location, date, and length of sessions.
- (2) To the Nominating Committee recommendations pertaining to the nominating and election procedures.
- (3) To the Committee on Resolutions recommendations pertaining to the resolutions procedure.
- (4) To the Diocesan Council recommendations pertaining to the agenda and calendar of business.

The Committee on Arrangements shall be responsible for all physical arrangements of the Convention.
